Department Of Architecture Co-Organizes International Conference

Huraera Jabeen, Senior Lecturer and Professor Fuad H Mallick, Chairperson jointly presented a paper on "Climate Change, Urban Poverty and the Built Environment" in one of the conversation sessions in Rajendrapur. On this occasion an article has been published in The Daily Star emphasizing on the challenges and opportunities for the designers of built environment working with urban poor in the context of climate change. Khondokar Hasibul Kabir, Senior Lecturer and Aminur Rahman, Lecturer of PPDM also joined the discussions in conversation and conference.

BDI Update

Pathways of Women's Empowerment, South Asia Hub

The Pathways of Women's Empowerment Research Programme Consortium (RPC) has had an eventful few months. With the first phase of the Research Programme drawing to an end in March 2009, members have been busy attending key events to network and disseminate information, completing research papers and preparing for the Programme's Mid-term Review conference in January.

In November, Maheen Sultan, Sohela Nazneen and Samia Rahim attended the 11th AWID Forum on "The Power of Movements" in Cape Town, South Africa that took place from 14 - 17 November, 2008. The Forum brought together women's rights activist from all over the world to debate and strategize about how to build stronger women's movements globally. At the AWID Forum, Pathways members took part in the following panels:

- i) Maheen Sultan and Sohela Nazneen presented on the panel "The NGO-ization of women's organizations and its implications for feminist organizing".
- ii) Samia Rahim moderated a talk show hosting Andrea Cornwall, Mbuyiselo Botha and Henry Armas titled "Women's Empowerment: what do men have to do with it"? Tremendous interest was shown in the topic with about 200 people turning up for the session, that was booked in a room with a capacity for 20. A lot of questions were asked in the discussion afterwards and the need to engage and recognize more men in discussions of feminisms was greatly felt.
- iii) Maheen Sultan facilitated the talk show hosted by the Women's Health and Rights Advocacy Partnership (WHRAP) titled "Building strong partnerships for improved sexual and reproductive health rights and rights in South Asia."
- iv) Maheen Sultan also facilitated a panel organised by Naripokkho on the Doorbar Network's experience of movement building.

Samia Rahim was selected to participate in the Feminist Technology Exchange (FTX), that was organized by the Association for Progressive Communications in partnership with AWID and Women's Net, that took place in Cape Town, South Africa from November 10-12, 2008 preceding the AWID Forum. At the FTX, Samia enrolled in the track for Digital Story Telling and produced a digital story called "Looking.." that narrates her experiences of race, class, religion and other identities that have left a mark on her.

Following the AWID Forum, Maheen Sultan, Sohela Nazneen, Zarina Rahman Khan and Amena Mohsin took part in the Building Constituencies Thematic Meeting of Pathways which was held from 18-22 November, 2008 in Cape Town. The Local Governance team of Bangladesh presented the first draft of their paper on Women in Local Government there. Sohela Nazneen and Maheen Sultan presented a draft of the paper on constituency building by women's organisations.

Samia Huq, Research fellow from the Pathways team, joined a special discussion organised by Nijera Kori regarding the spread of Islamic fundamentalism in Bangladesh and what this might mean for women's activism on the 21st of November 2008.

In December, Sahida Khondaker, Aanmona Priyadarshini, and Shaila Yasmin Kona participated in a training that taught the use Participatory Video for research purposes. This training was organized by the Citizenship DRC, also based at BRAC University, from 13 - 15 December, 2008.

Samia Huq and Firdous Azim joined a special discussion organised by BRAC Development Institute (BDI) on "Globalising Development Knowledge" held on the 18th of November, 2008. This event was jointly organised by IDS, and Naila Kabeer from the Pathways team was also part of this group.

On 11th January, 2009 Dr. Sohela Nazneen was invited to be a panelist on RTV's live talk-show "Road to Democracy". Regarding the policies around female migrant workers, Sohela debated whether the government was successfully negotiating on behalf of women when exporting labour to different countries and giving due importance to skill sets available. She also brought into the discussion an analysis of women's development strategies listed in the Election Manifesto's of the leading political parties in the recent elections, highlighting the findings of the Pathways research on the Discourses of Women's Empowerment. This sparked a lively debate especially because the one of the panelists, Dr Atiur Rahman, was a writer of one of the election manifesto.

The Pathways Programme held it's Mid-Term Review Conference in Cairo, Egypt from 20-24 January which was also attended by representatives of the programme's funder, DFID. Eight members of the Bangladesh

The review conference was followed by a Management Committee Meeting on 24th January evening that was attended by Maheen Sultan, Coordinator of Pathways South Asia.

A Communications Training for the Pathways Communication Team took place from 26-28 January to formulate a strategy around effective communications and Samia Rahim, the communications officer of the South Asia hub, attended this.

The Pathways team is now busy finalizing the research papers presented at the Review Conference in order to publish them in various book volumes and is also planning for the second phase of the research programme.

BDI and Department of Architecture hosts International Conference on Urban Poverty and Climate Change

BRAC Development Institute Department of Architecture, BRAC University in association with Brooks World Poverty Institute, University of Manchester hosted the International Conference on Climate Change and Urban Poverty - Infrastructures of Development on 28 January, 2009, at BRAC Centre. The conference focused on the pressing issues of climate variability on the living conditions of the urban poor. Participants from different countries, including, South Africa, UK, Malaysia, India, and Pakistan presented papers, focusing on various dimensions of climate change effects on urban centres around the world. Honourable Minister of Finance, Mr. A.M.A Muhith was the Chief Guest while BRAC Founder and Chairperson, Mr. Fazle Abed was the Special Guest. Professor Jamilur Reza Choudhury, VC BRAC University chaired the opening session.

Prior to the conference, academics from BWPI and BDI and BRAC University and other notable academics engaged in a two day long workshop at Rajendrapur, focusing on issues of health, governance, built environment, livelihoods and community resilience to impacts of climate change on urban centres. Professor Caroline Moser, Director of Global Urban Research Centre at University of Manchester presented the key paper on "Towards pro-poor adaptation to climate change in the urban centres of low- and middle-income countries". Professor David Hulme, Professor Tony Addison and Professor Simon Guy were also at "Rajendrapur Conversation". By the end of the workshop, research questions were identified which will guide future action research and policy interventions.

Collaboration in Country Wide Teaching Training

The Centre for Languages (CfL) has extended its support to improve the quality of English language skills of BRAC Primary School (BPS) teachers working for the under privileged children in collaboration with BRAC Education Programme (BEP). With this view, CfL prepares for a four-module course to train the teachers in order to develop their standard of English language and teaching methodology after several interactions, discussions, class observations and focus group discussions with teachers, trainers and students of BPS in Manikgonj. Initially, CfL launched the piloting phase on January 17, 2009 with 80 teachers at Savar Training and Resource Centre (TARC) which will end in August 2009. CfL hopes to stand beside BEP to facilitate the same training with more than 32,000 BEP school teachers nationwide in the near future.

CfL Lecturer Sanjoy Banerjee Promoted to Lecturer II

Sanjoy Banerjee of Centre for Languages (CfL) has been promoted to Lecturer II effective from January 2009. A Visit by Professor Mike Harrison

Michael Harrison, retired Dean for Teaching and Learning at the School of Education, University of Manchester in the UK, visited IED from 3-9 January, 2009. Prof. Harrison is now a consultant for the National College for School Leadership. His visit was in connection with the delivery of the Post-Graduate Diploma and MEd programme on Educational Leadership, Planning and Management which IED expects to offer in June 2009. During his stay this time, Mr. Shukla also facilitated a 2-day national consultative workshop on 'Exploring the Challenges of Curriculum Development and Implementation' involving a wide range of stakeholders, especially government agencies such as PEDPII, NAPE and NCTB.

Workshop on Continuing Education Frame-work

Non-Formal Education/ Life-Long Learning (NFE/LLL) team of IED organized a workshop on "Continuing Education (CE) Frame-work" at IED conference room in December 2008. The purpose of the workshop was to develop CE frame-work for setting up CE standard to provide direction and achieve quality of life through CE.

The specific objectives were to develop a frame-work with a focus on 6 specific areas (Post Literacy, Quality of Life Improvement & Life skills, IGP, Career Development, Education and training program, Equivalency program, Future oriented program) to pave a smooth path for advancement in learning.

Through the workshop the presenters share proposed CE framework for setting up CE standard to achieve common quality of CE program.

Postgraduate Diploma in Early Childhood Development (ECD)

After a successful completion of Post-Graduate Certificate course in ECD, Early Childhood Development Resource Centre (ECDRC) has commenced its next phase of the course at Postgraduate Diploma in ECD in January 2009. The first course "Contemporary Issues in ECD" (ECD 526) was facilitated by Dr. Faith Lamb Parker, Associate Professor, Columbia University. The course was conducted from 4-15 January, 2009. Dr. Chowdhury SB Jalal, Senior Research fellow, Research & Evaluation Division, BRAC and Sakila Yasmin, Lecturer, IED, contributed as co-facilitators in this course.

World Bank Institute and IED plan joint training course

David Harding, Team Leader for Education at the World Bank Institute (WBI), Washington D.C. visited IED on 17 December for a planning meeting to organise a workshop on Educational Reforms Strategies in Dhaka early in 2009. WBI is interested in customising such a course, usually offered in Washington, for Bangladesh in collaboration with IED. Harding and Dr. Manzoor Ahmed, Senior Adviser, IED met Bangladesh Officials including the Secretaries of Ministry of Education, Ministry of Primary and Mass Education and the Economic Relations Division. The senior officials thought that the course would be helpful and agreed to offer government support for organising the course and designating participants for it. Dr. Harding saw the possibility of collaboration with BRAC University and other Institutions in the region to organise the course on a regular basis to serve countries in the region.

Manzoor Ahmed speaks at International Forum on Education of Ethnic Groups in Kunming, China IED Senior Adviser, Dr. Manzoor Ahmed, attended as a resource person in the International Forum on Education of Ethnic Minorities organised by the UNESCO International Institute for Rural Education at Baoding, China. The Forum was held from 27-29 December at Kunming, capital of Yunnan province, taking advantage of the high proportion of ethnic populations in Yunnan and on-going programmes of cooperation among neighbouring countries of China, Laos, Vietnam and Myanmar for ethnic groups which transcended national borders. The UNESCO-supported Institute expressed interest in collaboration with IED to share experience of IED and BRAC initiatives in education to assist ultra-poor groups and promote rural transformation. Further exchange in this regard is planned in the near future.

National Consultative Workshop on 'Exploring the Challenges of Curriculum Development and Implementation'

A two-day long seminar cum workshop was organized by IED on 26 -27 January, 2009. The first half a day session termed as 'seminar' was focused on issues and concerns in our national curriculum practice where representatives from various government, non-government national and international organizations such as NCTB, NAPE, BAFED, PEDP II, UNDP, UNICEF, RNE, SDC, AISD, FIVDB, DAM, Plan Bangladesh, Save the Children-USA, CAMPE and BRAC participated. The welcome speech was given by Dr. Manzoor Ahmed,

Senior Advisor, IED who was one of the resource persons amongst the three. Dr. Siddiqur Rahman, Team Leader, PEDP II addressed on 'The Challenges in Curriculum from PEDP II Perspectives' and the Chief Guest, Prof. Haspia Bashirullah, Senior Member, NCTB (on behalf of Dr. Md. Masir Uddin, Chairman, NCTB) gave her speech on 'The Challenges in Curriculum from National Perspectives'.

The main workshop with the overarching aim to explore, identify and discuss challenges related to curriculum practice in Bangladesh primary education from different key stakeholders' perspective and in the light of the next phase of primary education development up to 2015 and onwards was facilitated by Subir Shukla, an international education consultant. The workshop was focused on few key questions and topics such as 'Envisioning our 'Child', What are the qualities we would like to develop/see in our children, Implications for curriculum, What are the difficulties that children and teachers face in the classroom and school' and so on. The key components were identified in groups and later shared and discussed in large groups. As an outcome of the workshop everyone including 10 senior curriculum specialists from NCTB shared the similar views that there should be a platform or network for going forward to developing a better curriculum framework in Bangladesh. To sum up the workshop discussion, everyone moved toward a consensus that a collaborative approach should be introduced within a short period of time.

Training on "Strengthening Skills Related to Child Friendliness"

With a view to strengthening skills related to child friendliness and as a venture towards promoting child friendly research, IED signed a contract on year-long episodic training with Inner Force, a capacity building organisation on early childhood development, child care, child psychology and development. November 2008 saw the launching of a five-day-long in-house capacity building training as an initial part of a year-long training program which would consist of a series of similar trainings. Focusing on "Communication and Motivation", Farida Akhtar, a developmental psychologist from Inner Force facilitated all of the sessions citing real instances from different case studies and relevant contexts. Starting from November 2, 2008 and ending on November 6, 2008, the training had altogether a number of fifteen sessions that encompassed the following topics and areas:

motivating a child, effective communicative style, nature of the learners, qualities of good communicator, socio-emotional support, socio-emotional development, motivation, care and support, socialization process, physical vs. mental growth, child's need, memory structure, socio-emotional development, attachment and bondage, self concept vs. egocentrism and finally on different basic components of child psychology. November's training on "Communication and Motivation" was followed by a two day-follow up in December 2008.

Second phase of the episodic training was focused on "Child Care and Child Development" and it took place from 11-15 January 2009. Below are some of the topics covered in the training: socio-emotional development, children's needs, abuse and punishment, positive disciplining tools, etc.

MNS Update

Young Scientists of Asia Conclave, Bangalore, India

Ms. Moushumi Zahur participated in "Young Scientists of Asia Conclave, A Meeting of Concerned Young Scientists", held in Bangalore, India from January 15 to 17, 2009. The main theme of the seminar was "Pressing Problems of Humankind (Energy & Climate)". She participated in an open discussion session and shared the ideas and views with other participants representing different countries of Asia.

New Faculty Joining the Department

Dr. Rafiqul Islam joined the Department as an Assistant Professor in Statistics while Mr. Mo. Rokibul Islam and Mr. Khandker Md. Mahmudul Hasan joined as Lecturers in Mathematics and Physics respectively. All of them joined BRACU on January 15, 2009.

International Botanical Conference, **Dhaka**

Dr. Aparna Islam participated in the International Botanical Conference held at Dhaka from January 16-18, 2009. The theme of the Conference was "Challenge of botanists in overcoming the changing environment". The Conference was organized by the Bangladesh Botanical Society and was held at the Teachers - Students Centre (TSC), University of Dhaka. Scientists and researchers from home and abroad affiliated with different R&D institutions and universities attended the conference. Several papers were presented in eleven technical sessions. Dr. Aparna Islam acted as a rapporteur in the session entitled "Micro propagation"

and in- vitro conservation". Ms. Jebunessa Choudhury, an MS student of biotechnology at BRACU presented a paper entitled "Establishment of a simple efficient in vitro regeneration protocol for locally grown tomato (Lycopersicon esculentum Miller) cultivars of Bangladesh" at the conference. The paper is based on her MS thesis work which is being carried out under the joint supervision of Dr Aparna Islam and Prof. Zeba I. Seraj of the University of Dhaka.

Topical Seminar

Mr. Al Amin Kabir presented a seminar talk entitled "CP Violation" on Thursday, January 22, 2009, at 10.00 am in Room AH-1501. The speaker elaborated the ideas of different symmetry principles of physics specially those applicable to particle physics. He showed how charge conjugation and parity symmetry were found to be maximally violated in nature and how they affected the evolution of our universe. He also delved into the reasons behind the predominance of matter over antimatter in the universe. The faculty members of the MNS Department and a few students attended the seminar. Lively discussion ensued the seminar.

International Conference on "Poverty and Climate Change-Infrastructures of Development"

Dr Mohammad Rafiqul Islam participated in a day - long International Conference on "Climate Change and Urban Poverty- Infrastructures of Development" held at BRAC Centre Auditorium, Dhaka on January 28, 2009. BRAC Development Institute, Department of Architecture, BRACU and Brooks World Poverty Institute, University of Manchester,

UK; jointly organized the Conference. Mr. Abul Maal Abdul Muhith , Honourable Minister for Finance, Government of Bangladesh was the Chief Guest. Mr. Fazle Hasan Abed, Founder and Chairperson, BRAC was the Special Guest. The Conference was chaired by Professor Jamilur Reza Choudhury, Vice Chancellor, BRAC University.

SPH Update

MPH Programme

The 4th batch of the MPH Program has been successfully completed. The graduating students will attend the 4th Convocation to be held on 5th February 2009 at BCDM, Rajendrapur. The SPH is now preparing to welcome the 5th Batch MPH students. The next MPH Program is going to start on February 15, 2009. Before starting the classes on 15th February, there will be an orientation program at Savar TARC on February 14, 2009.

Events

Visit of Harvard Students to JPG SPH and BRAC

Four students from the Harvard School of Public Health visited the School and other projects of BRAC in Bangladesh. The group of students visited James P Grant School of Public Health on 5th of January. They held discussions with the faculty and staff of the School and tried to understand about the various academic and research activities of the School. The group of students also participated in the field trips arranged by BRAC. They observed health, education, micro-credit and other income generating projects operated by BRAC during their six days programme. The students actively participated in different group discussions with BRAC staff and BRAC beneficiaries. They tried to enhance their knowledge by the hands on experience in the field. One of the Interns from BRAC School of Public Health also participated in the field visits. Md Fariduzzaman Rana form BRAC communication division and Nakib Rajib Ahmed from James P Grant School of Public Health facilitated the students during their visit to BRAC School of Public Health and BRAC. The programme ended on 11th of January.

ASG on Biostatistics

As the School is growing it is leading many important research activities, and as most are using mixed method tools, it is necessary to have some knowledge about statistics. With this objective in mind, as well as to build and scale up capacity in statistics, the young professionals of the School has initiated a regular Bio-statistics session which is being held every week. After some formal and informal meetings to review and finalize the outlines and after getting a formal approval from the senior management, the plan turned into action on 11th January, 2009 with the strong desire and inspiration of all members. In January there were three sessions covering introduction to research steps, introduction to bio-statistics and frequency distribution, which were conducted by Dr. Nasima Selim, Mr, Tanvir Hasan and Mr. Shafiun Nahin Shimul.

Second short course on Qualitative Research Methodology, Thinking Qualitatively -2: Theory & Practice of Qualitative Research Methodology

The second short course on Qualitative Research Methodology, Thinking Qualitatively-2 was held from January 18-29, 2009 at SPH conference room. The course was primarily conducted by Shahaduz Zaman & Nasima Selim but other SPH and guest faculty were also involved. There were 22 participants from various development organizations like FHI, Action Aid, and also from BRAC, BRAC University IED & SPH who took part in the course.

5th ASG (Academic Group Study) Seminar

The Academic Study Group Seminar on Tuesday, January 20, 2009 focused on the importance of food as a part of health and wellbeing. The guest speaker for the seminar was Mr. Kazi Mamunur Rashid, Deputy Director of Institute of Sustainable Development at the University of Liberal Arts, Bangladesh. Mr. Rashid talked about the relationship between a man's body with the earth and spirituality. What we eat, when we eat and how we prepare our food define the degree of our physical and mental wellbeing. Time of sleep is also closely linked with our food intake and how our body processes the food that we take. He talked at length about the importance of protein, vitamins and minerals from vegetables and organically grown food as opposed to animal protein, sugar and soy bean oil as sources of ill-health. Participants asked questions regarding the challenges of maintaining a healthy diet given our lifestyle, dependence on others to prepare our food, and about availability of the healthier and organic choices of food. As a suggestion for maintaining good health, he stressed the importance of starting the change in diet by taking personal initiative and then moving on to motivating others in the process.

Dr. Sabina Faiz Rashid, Associate Professor was invited to teach at the Masters of Science in International Health Department of Tropical Hygiene and Public Health, University of Heidelberg. She was visiting from January 18 to 31st, 2009.

Anwar Islam PhD attended an Asia workshop on Pay for Performance in Cebu, Philippines from 15th to 23rd of January. The workshop was based on Pay for Performance (P4P) approach i.e. providing incentives to

service providers lead to impressive improvements in their area of work such as immunization coverage, utilization of prenatal care, and deliveries attended by skilled birth attendants. Sponsored by USAID, AusAID, and the Center for Global Development, NORAD and the World Bank, this regional workshop welcomed 16 teams of three "stakeholders" from countries in Asia to learn about the Pay for Performance (P4P) approach to health system strengthening. A total of about 30 participants was present in the workshop. On behalf of USAID, the workshop was organized by the consortium Health Systems 20/20.

Shuborna Camellia and Eram Cooper attended the 3rd national course on Violence against Women and Role of Health Care Providers in Mumbai, India. The course was held from 13th to 21st January, 2009. A wide variety of health care providers which included nurses and medical staff, activists, researchers and doctors came from different parts of India to attend this course. There were also participants from Nepal. The main objective of the course was to sensitize health service providers in identifying and handling victims of violence. On the whole the course aimed at incorporating violence against women as a wider public health concern.

Mr. Shafiun Nahin Shimul, Lecturer of the School, attended a day long workshop held at BRAC center on "Urban DOTS: Challenges and Perspectives" on 19th January. In this workshop, different stakeholder from WHO, NTP, BRAC and other partner NGOs were present. As he was running a project related to the topic, it was a learning experience for him and he also shared some experiences of the research project he was conducting. At the ending session of the workshop there was a group work on 'lessons learned and way forward' and he took the lead of his group which was highly acclaimed by the participants. Apart from this he also participated in an international conference entitled 'Climate change and Urban poor-the infrastructure of development' held at BRAC center on 28th January which was organized by BRAC Development Institute, Department of Architecture and University of Manchester.

Shuborna Camellia and Shahanoor Akter attended a workshop on "Research on violence against women" held during 25-28 Jan 2009 at BRAC CDM in Rajendrapur. The workshop was organized by VAW Global Network with grants from the Swedish authority SIDA/SAREC. The EU Asia Link Project: Building Partnership for Better Health is providing support to some of the School's activity and as well as helping the School with its capacity building along with the Asian and European partners.
