On the 28th of October 2016, the Urban Innovation Challenge was launched with the aim of finding ways to improve life in Bangladeshi cities. Each idea will then be tested in the field with up to BDT 500,000 in seed money.

The ideas will be evaluated on 5 main criteria: Innovation, Impact, Sustainability, Scalability and Entrepreneurial. And the winning teams will be given the opportunity to work with BRAC.




MONON presents I.C.U.

Truthfully speaking, working at newspapers -- whether it is a national daily or a campus monthly -- can leave one jaded. More often than not, one would find themselves at a perplexed space created by the published knowledge, or rather,

If newspapers, and indeed, other outlets of news are what propagate particular truths in its locus, and

form certain narratives, counter-narratives, events etc, then the process of the creation and proliferation of such news must be given some sort of importance.

At least, one would go into such work with that assumption. What one may end up learning is that in some cases, the truth that we put forward is not even one of shared concurrence. Sometimes, material that gets printed on the paper might not be the opinion of the editor, or the board members, or anyone else even involved in the process.

But they still get printed, the message still gets out onto the public. The message that essentially does not belong to anyone at all. And while that does sound like it is something leading up to a collective catastrophe, it actually might not be so. The thing is, survival is essential to produce and proliferate anything, and that survival would not be possible if all opinions, grand or otherwise, become news.

So sometimes, as the public, we will read stories that glorify, or that gloss over some of the dingy parts. And it might be frustrating, and we may wonder if freedom of expression truly has been quashed, but it is also good to remind ourselves that in order to have a platform for expression to survive, once in a while, some glossing over becomes necessary.

So, when the time comes for the necessary truths to propel forward, these platforms exist to deliver. In those cases, if we celebrate that which is glorified, so be it.

Science of the future

Course sequence university is pretty straightforward. Most students choose from a few common tracks laid down by our seniors. However, this fall gave the students of EEE department a shot at something unique. EEE490: Special Topics.

The course is being taken by Mr Anamul Haque, a lecturer at the department. Titled "Science & Technology of 2D Materials," a total of 22 eager students joined and are now preparing for the final exam. I sat down with Mr Anamul, who recently completed his MSc in Nanoscience & Nanotechnology from Europe, for a little Q&A.

Q: As a former student at BRAC *University, what was your overall* experience like?

A: My journey at BRACU was and is going great! I am honoured to be technically considered a colleague of those who I idolised when I was a student here, for example Prof Ziauddin Ahmad.

Q: What are the key differences that caught your eye between BRACU and the universities you visited in


A: Universities there are strongly linked with the industry. Companies fund research initiatives and the universities in return give them new and innovative ways of doing things. Professors take fewer classes per semester and are more researchoriented. Final exams too, are very different. Written exams were only 30 minutes but we would have to sit for a viva with only 15 minutes worth of preparation time. Stressful but interesting.

Q: What is nano-science?

A: The cross-section of a strand of our hair is about 50µm. Nanoscience is the physics of the elements a thousand times smaller than this. At this scale, Newtonian physics doesn't really work and we turn to quantum physics to explain what

Q: Why did you offer EEE490?

A: This course is about the fundamentals of 2-dimensional materials and their potential



The future applications. electronics will probably be shaped by materials such as graphene and MoS2 (Molybdenum Disulphide). I wanted to introduce these topics to our students. What we learn in class is directly related to the ongoing revolution in the semi-conductor industry.

Q: What is graphene?

A: It's very simple. Graphene is a single sheet of carbon atoms. Kind of like a sheet of paper, and just like paper, graphene is flexible. However, unlike paper, graphene is very good at conducting electricity.

Q: Are the students enjoying the class?

A: The response is promising. I was unsure at the beginning but very pleased to see the number of students. Their curiosity and enthusiasm motivate me to prepare for the next class.

Does CGPA matter?

I get this question every time I meet a fresh graduate or a student in their final year: "Does CGPA matter? Will I fail to get called in for an interview if my CGPA is

poor?" It is a fact that students who do not have sound CGPAs by their last semester are usually the ones who ask this question the most and that is not a coincidence. The answer to this question is that it depends. Do not worry, I will tell you why. It depends on a number of things. Starting from the company you are applying to, the nature of the job you are applying to, to the kind of skills required for the job, and many other reasons.

Some organisations take pride in hiring students with sound CGPAs, perhaps above 3.5. In many cases, it is because they are hiring for positions such as Management Trainee (MT) or Management Trainee Officers (MTO). These positions are strategic hiring initiatives, where employers look to hire students who are academically sound (as certified by their CGPA) and test them through rigorous interviews and assessments to determine if they have what it takes to be future leaders of the organisation. The MT/MTO career is a fast-track journey and it is a rarity that a student who has not demonstrated sincerity in academics would excel.

Having said that, I do not undermine the capability of any person but the fact of the matter is there needs to be a system and indicator of a student's capability and sincerity towards education, and that is the CGPA. After all, a student enrolls in a university to gain knowledge through education and of course through co-curricular activities. So yes, CGPA is important, but it is not the only important criteria.




Phase II



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






Phase V




Phase VI

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
