#### 1. INTRODUCTION:

Since its inception in 1978 Outreach has been working in rural areas with the aim of promoting the socio-economic conditions of rur ! poor (vulnerable to economic fluctuations and social pressures) through mobilization, conscientization and organization. The initial approach and working strategy of Outreach has proceeded through different transition-based on realities, constraints and experiences of working with the rural disadvantaged. The present approach of Outreach relies on a strategy which is pragmatic, flexible and conducive to form and develop institutions and help sustain spirit of unity and cooperation with a view to create conditions viable and dependable for healthy expansion as well as effective management of subsequent credit delivery and recovery mechanisms to be followed by an integrated development approach. As on December 31, 1985 a total of 404 male and 419 female Village Organisations have been formed with 22,116 male and 22,426 female membership. With programming, management, logistic and administrative back-up from Head Office Outreach activities have expanded to 462 villages operating through 18 centres spread over 42 unions, 11 Upazilas in eight districts. Outreach will see another phase of transition with the unification of Rural Credit and Training Programme (P TP) and Outreach under Rural Development Programme (RDP). Under RDF management Outreach will operate as BRAC's first line activity and lead the process of RDP expansion.

#### 2. COVERAGE: OVERALL AND PERIOD-WISE:

Outreach. Phase-II January 1934 through December 1985 aimed to cover 523 villages in 41 Unions of 11 Upazilas and form 1023 Village Organisations (V.Os). The data on overall and period wise (July - December) coverage in the above areas shows that a total of 29,817 landless households in 462 villages spread over 42 Union were covered and 823 Village Organisations in these villages and unions were formed. Of the Phase-II's total target, the achievement in the coverage of villages, formation of village organisations and enrollment of V.O. membership over the period was 88.3%, 80.4% and 76.8% respectively. While the period wise coverage (July - December 1985) for villages was 53, V.O. formation 96 and membership enrollment 7,011.

The Village Organizations serve as the primary forum for mobilization and organisational activities of the disadvantaged. As of December 1985, 823 V.Os with 22,116 men and 22,426 women membership were formed. Available data (Appendix-I) shows that the periodic wise (July - December 1985) rise in women V.Os as well as membership was higher than that of the men's V.Os and membership. Pactors which can be attributed to this noticeable progress and trend in women's organisational activities are: (1) Introduction of village level workers (Gram Shebikas) and (2) BRAC Credit Support for women economic programmes and their spread effect in the project areas.

Table I below presents the picture of periodwise growth and rise in institution-building activity in Outreach.

The above table shows a higher coverage of male population in most uprailes except Mirzapur, Dhamrai, Gaibandha and Kawnia. The high profile of women population enrollment in these Upazilas is the result of cumulative effects of various socio-economic factors, such as cultural advancement, severe economic crisis, low status of women in their homes and society and above all deployment of women worker (G.S.) in these upazilas.

#### 3.2 Higher Level Organization:

The recent and most important development in Outreach is the formation of Union level organizations known as the Union Representative Council (URC). To create and develop leadership of the poor and initiate group activities on a larger scale and in an effective manner at the Union level this is the logical process towards federation and unity among V.Os at union level. URC's hold meetings to discuss issues which V.Os can not resolve. Moreover, issues relating to wage bargaining, political representation, and pressures for obtaining just share in local govt. services and supports, are also discussed. Till December 1985, 12 Union Representative Councils have been formed in Outreach project unions. The efforts of union level organization towards achieving access to various local resources is viewed to be important from two counts. (1) It will initiate the process of integration, solidarity and awareness among the V.Os and (2) will ensure the accrual of benefits to the landless community which were denied to them by the power elites at village and union levels.

#### 4. PROGRAMME INPUTS:

# 4.1 Group Members Training:

Training to organised group members are of two categories (1) Human Development (HD), (2) Occupational Skills Development (OSD).

# 4.1.1 Human Development Courses:

This component of training includes mainly Consciousness
Raising, Functional Education, Leadership Development, Project
Planning and Implementation. Human Development Training Courses are
imparted to develop group members analytical power and ability so
that they can understand and analyse their own problems, life situation, and environment in a pragmatic way and come up with effective
strategies to respond to their needs.

The Table (Appendix II) shows the position of group members' training in Human Resource Development Sector. Upto December '85,

5,597 group members were given Human Development Training. Of the total members trained in Human Development Course—3,444 were trained in Consciousness Raising, 414 in Functional Education, 1,619 in Leadership Development and Project Flanning and 120 in Courses relevant to the Human Development aspects. During July-December 1935, 777 group were provided training in Human Development courses which is about 16.0% of June 1985 cumulative figure in this course.

## 4.1.2 Occupational Skill Training Course:

This course provides the participants with knowledge and skills necessary for formulation and implementation of income and employment creating activities. Occupational Skills Training includes courses in Poultry Rearing, Fish Culture, Agriculture, Bee Keeping and others. Upto December 1985, 1992 group members were given training in Occupational Skill Development Course. During July - December 1985, the total number of group members trained in Occupational Skills courses was 436, 28.1% of June 1985 cumulative figure in Skill Development Training during the period (July - December 1984).

The progress achieved in training is highly significant. Of the Phase-II target in training almost 91.1% was achieved by June 30, 1935. During the last six month (July-December 1985) of Phase-II, the total number of group members trained was 1,203, which means an excess of 579 group members over the Phase-II's total target (7,000) were trained. Group maturity and large scale involvement of group members in income and employment generation activities prompted the need for training of more group members in excess of the phase-II target.

# 5. FUNCTIONAL EDUCATION:

To raise the level of awareness, Literacy and Numeracy Skills and develop the analytical power of the group members Functional Education is provided. The Functional Education Table (Appendix-III)

shows an increasing trend in the number of learners enrolled and learners graduated in functional education course. Till December 1985, 9,581 group members eligible for functional education were enrolled as Functional Education Learners, out of which 3,982 (41.6%) completed the course (60 lessons) and the rest 5,599 (58.4%) could complete part of the course.

Till December 1985, a total of 410 Functional Education Centres were opened, out of which 222 (54.2%) centres completed their courses, 99 (24.2%) centres dropped without completion of course and 89 centres (21%) are continuing. Rainfall, migration during peak employment season have been the major contributors in the discontinuation of the 99 centres. Till December 1985, 99.6% of Phase-II's total target was achieved. Although the 100% target remains to be fulfilled, the periodwise achievement is significant.

#### 6. MEEPINGS AND WORKSHOP:

The V.O. and Group members hold weekly meetings apart from meetings of inter village, inter union and workshops on special issues. Issues which affect the members of the landless organization are discussed at the meetings and future actions are designed and planned. In all, 33,561 weekly meetings, 728 inter village workshops and 36 special workshops were held during January - December, 1985. (Appendix-IV).

On average each meeting was attended by 33.4 male members and 34.2 female members. Data reveals that the rate of absence was higher for the male members as compared to women members. Heavy rainfall, out migration during peak employment seasons, work load, and inability to pay weekly savings were major factors for causing absentism of male members. Regular Follow-up, motivation, and increased involvement of group members in collective economic and social programmes will help to improve the attendance rate.

#### 7. RESOURCE MOBILISATION:

Anything which increases or generates income and helps save expenditure or create new income either internal or external is considered as resource. Outreach's approach includes a broad spectrum of activities on mobilisation of resources. Among them Human Resource Development is paramount. The objective of developing human resource is to increase the skills and potentialities of the

organised poor so that they can plan, undertake and manage economic activities. Utilisation of unused and underused physical resources such as derelict ponds, Ehasland, ditches, vacant road side and access to available government services are examples of major resource mobilisation activities. Besides, certain specific actions are taken to mobilise women to deal with problems that directly affect them such as dowry and polygamy.

Resource mobilisation is essential for the target people as it fosters awareness for socio-economic upliftment and facilitates the development of inter group relationship. There are two broad categories of resource mobilisation (1) Internal and (2) External.

## 7.1 Internal Resource:

Among the various sources of internal resource mobilisation in Outreach, the generation of funds through voluntary saving of group members on weekly/monthly basis and profit from economic activities are important. The objective of internal fund generation is to:

- Develop group financial base
- Create or develop reserve, emergency and general fund from conomic project's income.
- Reduce group's dependency on external finance/aid
- Inculcate the habit of regular savings among the group numbers.

Upto December 1985, savings accumulated in the fund of 823 V.Os totalled Tk.2,491,564 out of which Tk.1,270,796 was accumulated in male V.O. funds and Tk.1,220,768 in female V.O. funds. (Appendix-V) During January - December 1985 the increase in the saving amounted to Tk.1,488,414 (Taka 699,622 for men V.Os and Tk.788,792 for women V.Os). Till December 1985 profit generated from the economic schemes amounted to Tk.81,046. As far as the Phase-II's planned target of saving is concerned, saving generation over the target (Tk.900,000 till December 1985 figured Tk.1,591,564. Table below depicts the status of per group and per membership saving in Outreach as on December 1985.

In the Land to the December 1984 figure, the saving per group and membership shows an increase of Tk.1,264,41 and 23.89 respectively over the period (During January - December 1985). (Appendix-V, Annual Report 1984).

The reserve, emergency and general funds also demonstrate an increase over the period to Tk.14,925 and 49,463 respectively. However, considering the economic conditions of the target group whose incomes are below the subsistence level this trend in savings is encouraging.

# 7.2 External Resource:

## 7.2.1 Borrowed Fund:

Funds accrued through borrowing from BRAC and other institutions is termed as borrowed fund. Upto December 1985 the amount accrued to the borrowed fund totalled Tk.2,406,142. Of the total amount generated in the fund Tk.1,945,240 (80.8%) was borrowed from BRAC and Tk.460,902 (19.2%) from other sources and institution (men and women groups). The fund generation Table (Appendix-V) depict a periodic (July - December 1985) increase of Tk.1,854,677 which is about 336.32% of cumulative figure, June 1985. The increased volume of borrowed funds is analysed during the period (July - December 1985) to have been resulted in the accelerated rate of economic activities and sizeable increase in the amount of loan for women programmes. Data reveals that with the increased flow of BRAC loans to women group for income generating projects their borrowing from other exploitative sources and institutions comes down from Tk.106,456 in June 1985 to Tk.1,742 in December 1985. In order to become solf reliant and reduce dependency on external fund, the women group must strive hard to yield better result from the utilisation of fund borrowed otherwise they will be in perpetual indebtedness instead of achieving self reliances.

#### 7.2.2 Group Members Access to Resources:

The resource mobilization Table (Appendix-XI) illustrates V.Os efforts in mobilizing available local resources during the second phase period. During the period the group members (V.Os) obtained access to 5 market (leased), 72,007 maunds of FWP wheat, 962 maunds of VGF wheat, 16 khas ponds, 59.06 acres of khas land, 285,509 dose of poultry vaccines, 1,674 HYV eggs, 2,700 HYV cock/chicks. Besides these, other significant areas of mobilization were the reexcavation of 231 ponds and earning Tk.22,929 from poultry vaccination, levelling of 11.94 acres of fallow land and plantation of 60,550 trees of different varieties. Fallow land levelled were brought under the winter vegetable cultivation.

## 8. FCONDITIC PROGRAMME:

Economic programmes undertaken in Outreach are classified into two broad categories (i) Individual (ii) Collective. The benefits accruing from the economic programmes are:

- Lean period employment opportunities (at a time when job opportunity become scarce, demand for labour shrinks, and wages are reduced).
- Higher wage and demand for labour.
- Cooperative spirit and community feeling (among the target group members).
- Income/Profit from projects.
- Expansion of reserve and emergency fund and strengthening of financial base.
- Raduction of dependency on power elites.

Upto December 1985, 545 V.O/Group (66.2%) were involved in economic programmes—collective and individual. The amount invested in collective programme totalled Tk.1,699,785 (46.2%) and in individual programme totalled Tk.1,984,178 (53.8%). During July - December 1985, the incremental amount in collective and individual activity figured Tk.390,817 and 1,442,987 respectively. Of the total investment in economic programme, the investment by female V.Os accounted for 67.2% (Tk.2,474,029) and the remaining 32.8% (1,209,931) accounted for male investment. Of the total female investment Tk.528,789 (21.3%) was used from the group own fund as credit and Tk.1,945,240 (78.7%) was borrowed from BRAC. The female V.Os had a greater share in the total investment owing to BRAC's credit support to them.

## MAJOR SECTORAL PROGRAMME:

#### 9.1 Poultry:

Keeping a few chickens around the village home is not unusual to the rural women in Bangladesh, in that sense poultry rearing is classified as pre-existing resource. With this end in view BRAC considers poultry rearing to be one of the most viable activity for generating income as well as supplementing nutritional requirements at the family level.

As on December 1985, Tk.243,580 was involved in this sector, which is 1.2% of the total investment in economic activities. Group members involved in the programme numbered 5126; out of which 1019 members were given training in poultry and the remaining 4107 members have benefitted from the orientations given by the trained group members. Of the total trained members-165 (16.2%) received training in basic orientation, 194 (19.1%) in bird. vaccination, 574 (56.3%) in rearing and management and the rest 86 (8.4%) as model rearers. Group members earning from vaccination (group + non-group members) of birds totalled Tk.22,929. Till December 1985, a total of 198,271 birds were vaccinated, out of which group members birds numbered 148,156 (74.7% of total). To ensure the programme growth and expansion 2658 HYV cock/chick and 1654 HYV Egg were distributed as of December 1985. The mortality rate of the supplied chick/cocks was 15.8%. In order to protect the birds from rain, sun, damage and predators, a total of 5,126 poultry sheds were distributed. Poultry vaccines distributed totalled 285,509 doses of which BCRDV, RDV and 7. Pox totalled

79,341, 189,076 and 16,400 doses respectively. Till December 1985, the income accrued to the key/model rearers from sale of birds figured Tk.2,430,000.

#### 9.2 Agriculture:

Under the existing production relations and socio-economic structure where the opportunities of landless to obtain access to land and land related development activities are limited. Group members involvement in agricultural activities through share cropping, release of mortgaged land by paying off the mortgaged money is extremely important. Because all these activities provide the opportunities for accrual of benefits from the land related development activities. Apart from the crop cultivation - other forms of benefits that was made available particularly to the women's group members were supply of winter and summer vegetables seeds at cost price. Till December 1985, total group members involved in Agriculture numbered 7042, 26.94% of the total members involved in economic programme. The total investment in this sector over the period was Tr.635,926, 17.3% of the total investment. During July-December 1985, the increase in the share of this sector was Tk. 335, 414.

## 9.3 Rural Industries:

This sector comprises activities - such as net making, food processing, coir making, cane works and mat making. As of December 1985, Tk.930,112 was invested in these activities and 1,488 members involved, thus reducing unemployment and providing off season employment opportunities. The investment in this sector rose from Tk.111,870 in June 1985 to Tk.930,112 in December 1985 - an increase of Tk.818,242 over the period.

# 9.4 Rural Eusiness:

Jute, mustard, potato and other items such as molasses etc. and leasing of market. Jute, paddy and mustard seeds are stocked when prices were low and sold out at premium prices during off season. Markets are leased by the group members against payment of leased value for a certain period. The total investment in this sector was Tk.839,372. The periodic increase in the investment of this sector figured Tk.730,908, which is 19.8% of the total investment in economic activities. (Appendix-XII).

## 9.5 Fish Culture:

Till December 1985, the share of this sector in total investment was Tk.527,495. The periodic (July - December) increase in the share of this sector figured Tk.261,351, 7.1% of the total investment in economic activity. Fonds undertaken for fishculture numbered 251 out of which 127 were big and 104 were mini ponds. Of the total ponds undertaken for pisciculture 169 (70.4%) were suitable for year round cultivation and 62 (25.8%) for seasonal cultivation. As'far as ownership of the pond is concerned 189 (81.8%) were owned by group members while the remaining 42 (18.2%) belonged to the non-group members. The BRAC supported and self-financed ponds numbered 163 and 63 respectively. All the pends undertaken for fish culture have been taken on a lease basis and reexcavated at a cost of Tk.1,173,733. In order to ensure scientific process of cultivation and better management a handout on fish culture and management was made available to all Outreach project centres. With the increase in the skill and technical knowledge for fish culture management a substantial progress will be achieved and the programme will find a new dimension both as source of income and protein to the group people. (Appendix-X).

## 9.6 Apiculture:

Apiculture programmes have been undertaken in 4 branches in Outreach without credit support. Group members trained so far in Bee Keeping (from TARC Savar) during January - December 1985 numbered 18. After training was over, they were provided with Bee Boxes and Extractors. The programme has resulted in the employment of 18 group members directly. The group members are earning by selling honey. Till December 1985, income earned from the sale of honey totalled Tk.14,400. The programme has proven promising both as a source of income to the concerned group members and agricultural production increases through pollination in the neighbouring areas.

#### 10. CONSUMPTION LOAN:

To address the need of the group members during the critical periods such as 'sod crisis, daughter's marriage expenses, emergency medical expenses consumption leans are provided. Although this lean yields no return but it plays very important role at a time when the poor and assetless group members try to establish their old patron-client relationship. To respond to such emergencies,

a sum of Tk. 243,441 was disbursed from the group fund (Appendix-VIII) as incidental loan (till December, 1985) out of which Tk.176,554 (72.5%) was loaned out to 816 members (569 male and 247 female) against food purchase, Tk.15,717 (6.5%) against medical expenses to 111 members (51 male and 60 female), Tk.10,500 (4.3%) against marriage expenses to 41 members (20 male and 21 female) and Tk.40,670 (16.7%) against house repairing and other expenses to 215 members. It is worth mentioning that loan for meeting group members consumption needs was disbursed from groups own fund, since BRAC discourages loan in non-productive pursuits from external source.

## 11. WOMEN AND DEVELOPMENT:

The basic problems which woman have in common is that existing socio-economic structures do not allow them with equal opportunities for renumerative employment, for access to productive resources, inputs, credit and participation in the decisions which affect them. With a view to improve the status of woman both at home and in the society, BRAC focuses on the development of women as an independent unit which would enable them to achieve control over the resources needed for their development. The total fund generation for women groups (Appendix-V) depicts an increase of Tk.2, 131,071. During July - December 1985 the amount of women's investment in economic activities also shows an increase of Tk.1,816,234. Of the total fund generated by the women groups Tk.1,945,240 was borrowed from BRAC and Th. 1,312,822 as loan from groups own fund. Till December 1985, the women groups implemented variety of economic programme which included paddy husking, small trading, agriculture, livestock, mat/net making, fried rice production, coir making and food processing and bee keeping.

# 12. CREDIT AND WOMEN PROGRAMME:

As on December 31, 1985, Tk.1,945,240 was disbursed to 2655 women against 300 schemes. Of the total disbursement 38.1% was loaned out to 35 women against husking of paddy, 29.3% against small trading, 17.5% against livestock, 14.1% against rural/cottage industries and 1.1% against agriculture. The interest provision against the total disbursement figured Tk.57,943. The total amount realised (Frincipal + Interest) was Tk.602,395, and outstanding principal over the period was Tk.1,400,788, out of which the outstanding principal for paddy husking figured Tk.566,272, for small trading Tk.383,149, for agriculture Tk.10,428, for livestock Tk.274,662 and for Rural/Cottage Industries Tk.166,272. of the total

disbursement paddy husking project shared the highest amount Tk.741,990 (38.1%), followed by small trading Tk.568,900 (29.2%), Livestock Tk.340,400 (17.5%), Rural/Cottage Industries Tk.273,450 (14%) and agriculture Tk.20,500 (1.1%). (Appendix-XIII & XIV).

During January - December 1985, the total credit disbursement for the income and employment generating project of the woman groups was Tk.1,897,990. Loan disbursed to the women has been taken out of the RCTP loan funds. Since Outreach and RCTP was planned to be amalgamated with effect from January 1986 it was thought advisable to start loan operation in Outreach under the RCTP procedure.

#### 13. CONCLUSION:

The Cutreach programme has succeeded in organizing the poor as the strong counterveiling force in the project areas through intensive education and conscientization and in building group solidarity and integrity through a continuous process of social action. The present success in resource mobilization shows a great promise, however the enthusiasm for resource mobilization is likely to decline since the opportunities for resource mobilization are likely to be exhausted and fewer social issues will be available to be addressed. In rural areas where unemployment is endemic and income opportunities are extremely limited resource mobilization alone is not likely to sustain the militancy of the organised poor much longer. People may Toose confidence and fall back upon the old patron-client relationship and \_ thereby defeat the very purpose of BRAC in empowering the rural poor. Thus income vis-a-vis employment opportunities have to be created to sustain the interest and motivation of the people and help introduce BRAC's subsequent programmes aiming at overall development of the landless poor.
