The Manikganj Integrated Project (MIP) has completed a decade. BRAC started operations in Manikganj through a preparatory Food-for-Work programme in 1976 which slowly evolved into an Integrated Development Project covering 232 villages. MIP's avowed goal is transfer of technology to target group members resulting in a concomitant sense of self reliance.

The methodology which BRAC adopted for the achievement of its objectives is roughly through the following sequence of activities:

1. Functional education classes
2. Group formation
3. Joint economic activities
4. Joint social action
5. Group - based health and family planning services
6. Group education.

BRAC's target population are those without access to the means of production, landless and marginal farmers, fishermen and artisans without implements and raw materials, labourers and destitute women. Functional Education graduates from these social categories are organised into men's and women's groups in order to carry out activities that can benefit them. With 20-25 members, the group sets up a Group Savings Fund with members' weekly contributions, and individuals are selected for training as leaders, paramedics etc. to organise social and economic activities for the group.

MIP has completed Phase-III of its activities. Briefly, each phase covered the following time-period and represents the following stages:

Phase-I: Development of Strategies; April 1976-March 1979.

During this phase, BRAC tested innovative methods and strategies of development and evolved the methodology outlined above.

Phase-II: Expansion; April 1979 - March 1982.

During this phase, BRAC refined its strategies for development and expanded its coverage.

Phase-III: Expansion and Consolidation; April 1982 -
March 1985.

During this phase, BRAC completed its coverage of the target villages (232), and strengthened the organizational base of the target group members. This it did through the formation of Village Organizations (VOs) and Union Co-ordinating Committee (UCCs). These Village Organization were found as a logical step towards amalgamating isolated groups into Village, Union and Upazila level organizations. This strengthened the solidarity and unity of the disadvantaged group members and resulted in fostering a spirit of co-operation among them. It also gave them greater bargaining power as an united entity to press for just wages, pressure for local government resources, protest social injustice and strive for political representation.

1. Extension Period Phase IV: July 1985 - December 1987.

1.1 Institution Building:

In phase-IV, MIP concentrated on amalgamating the individual groups in a village into village-level organizations (VOs), one male and one female in each village. Coverage of 182 targeted villages and an additional 50 villages have been incorporated bringing the total to 232. The VO formation position is:

The next step was the formation of men's and women's Union Coordination Committees (UCCs). Two delegates from each VO (two men and two women) are selected to their local UCC which has 40-60 members from 20-30 villages of a union. Presently, there are 10 UCCs in the 5 Camps of the Manikganj Integrated Project, as follows:

1. Manikganj - 3
2. Balirtek - 2
3. Krishnapur - 1
4. Gorpara - 2
5. Betila - 2

At the next level - the Up-sila level - an Up-sila Coordination Committee (UCCO) was formed comprising of two men and two women selected from each UCC by consensus. Thus, there are 40 members in the UCCO. The purpose of the UCCO is to further consolidate the organization of the poor, allowing the most skilled and articulate members of the groups to represent them in their demands for the government services they are entitled to, to monitor village projects and other work being undertaken by UCC groups, and to serve as a communication conduit between the official administration and the village groups. It also serves as a kind of court (shalish) to handle legal and other contentious matters that cannot be resolved by the UCCs. The 40 members of the UCCO have equal status but different functions such as accounting (rural credit, etc.), communications, technical matters etc. and the convenor (Abhayot) is appointed by consensus of the 40. In addition, 2 technical sub-committees of the UCCO have been formed, for health and for livestock. The purpose of these is to facilitate access to technical assistance for the VCs, calling on outside expertise when necessary. Other technical committees are planned: for women's affairs, agriculture, and income/employment generation.

1.2 Education

1.2.1 Functional Education:

In the Extension Period, i.e. from July 1985 to December 1987, 117 Functional Education Centres (FEC) were opened, with an enrolment of 2404 learners, 961 men and 1443 women. Of these, 100 FEC completed the course with 2495 graduates, 722 men and 1473 women (see Table -- for details).

1.2.2 Non-Formal Primary Education (NFPE):

During the reporting period a new activity was introduced in NIP, a non-formal primary education programme for the children of the disadvantaged. This is a 3 year's course designed for the older children (8 - 9 years old) who are out of school or have dropped out of school. The course covers basic literacy, numeracy, health and hygiene and environmental studies. The curriculum, which has been specially developed by BRAC, is tailored to the children's needs. It has been developed in such a way that the children will be able to transfer to formal schools, should they wish to continue further studies. The classes are of 2 1/2 hours duration, 6 days a week and the teachers are recruited

locally with a minimum of 10 years of schooling. They are trained intensively by BRAC and teachers' training and refresher courses are an ongoing activity.

An important feature of the NFPE programme is community participation. A committee is formed composed of the teacher, BRAC Programme Organizer, parents' representatives and village elders. They meet once a month to discuss about the school and its problems and seek ways and means to solve them. It may be mentioned that, as BRAC is actively encouraging girls' education in a country where their education is neglected, there are more girls than boys in the NFPE centres. Presently, there are 164 NFPE centres in MIF.

1.3 Para Legal Programme:

During this phase MIF developed a para legal programme. From each ward (subdivision of a union) MIF developed one male and one female group member as para legal cadres. They were trained in different kinds of law such as family law, inheritance law, civil law and judiciary law. After getting the training, the para professionals gave an awareness training to the group members of their wards. Generally male group members gave this training to male village organizations and women to women's village organizations. Presently, there are 33 male and 31 female para professionals in MIF.

1.4 Employment Generation:

In the extension period off-farm schemes were emphasised and developed while other employment generating activities were consolidated and intensified.

1.4.1 Agriculture:

Agriculture provides the maximum concentration of employment throughout Manikganj. Presently, the women's groups are also getting involved in agricultural activities in areas which are non-traditional for them. Training in agricultural skills have been provided to both men and women.

It is interesting to note that more and more rural disadvantaged women are taking up agricultural activities as a source of income and employment generation. Whereas there were only 480 women involved in the agriculture programme at the beginning of the reporting period i.e. 1985, presently the number stands at 1814. A break down of this number, camp-wise is shown below:

1.4.2 Irrigation:

MIF had introduced a new concept in agriculture in Manikganj- to enable those who do not possess land (a primary means of production) to control water (a major means of production). The strategy was to assist organized groups of landless to acquire irrigation facilities i.e. shallow and deep tubewells. With these the landless would sell water to the cultivators in exchange for cash or a share of the crop.

BRAC discovered that quite a number of Deep Tubewells (DTWs) were lying unused. Therefore, it decided to utilize this resource by either buying them or hiring them. It also bought some second hand DTWs from Bangladesh Agricultural Development Corporation (BADC) and hired some. The irrigation programme had three objectives:

- provide employment
- increase production
- improve the management and maintenance skills of the rural landless.

Previously, the MIF groups were not big enough to handle big enterprises such as DTWs. Now, the VOs, UCCs and Upazila Committees are able to handle such ventures and have the necessary training. Moreover, with the handling of such large enterprises, the landless have more socio-economic power and standing in the community.

During this extension period, MIF in cooperation with CARE, an American NGO, carried out an intensive irrigation programme. CARE is providing technical and management training on Deep Tubewells (DTWs) for members involved in the irrigation project. CARE will provide engineers, agronomists, etc., who will stay in one area for 3 years. Thus, when they depart after that period, BRAC will be able to handle the programme. Information on the irrigation programme is presented below:

An additional 6 DTWs were selected and have already been taken in the irrigation programme for the next year's season.

1.4.3 Seri/Eri Culture:

Seri/Eri culture in MIF does not only involved the raising of cocoons, but also the spinning of yarn, weaving, tailoring and embroidery. It's a whole integrated industry with the output of one providing the raw material for the other. The women involved in the seri/eri culture programme have one advantage. They sell their product to the Ayesha Abed Foundation Centre for women which supplies the finished goods to Asrong, BRAC's marketing outlet, Kamiko and other craft shops in town.

BRAC's target was to train 1000 women in rearing and spinning in the Ericulture programme. Although up to Phase-III in 1985, 1000 women had been trained, 276 women had left the programme for various reasons such as marriage, family migration and insufficient time due to too many household responsibilities. Therefore, in the reporting period, i.e. July 1985-Dec. 1987, an additional 276 women were trained to complete the target.

In the sericulture programme, some of the families who have land cultivate mulberry bushes while others plant trees around the homestead. In 1985-87, 150,739 seedlings were distributed to the group members involved in the sericulture programme. Continuous follow up and service support is given to group members on an ongoing basis.

The total number of group members involved in the sericulture programme up to December 1987 was 1542. Families involved in bush and tree cultivation were 104 and 1438 respectively. The total acreage for bush was 31.01 acres and for trees 147.25 acres. The total number of trees upto December '87 is 62,187 tree exist. If we compare the previous reports of MIP we see that sericulture is gaining popularity as an off-farm occupation especially for women and a non-traditional technology has successfully been transferred to this area and taken root.

1.4.4 Block Printing/Embroidery:

Block printing has been a very successful programme as a means of off-farm employment for the rural women. In Phase-III, 8 production centres (block printing, weaving and embroidery) were opened. Although there was no plan in the extension proposal to train additional group members in block printing, strong demand for block printed items has necessitated the training of 30 women during the extension period and the pressure created will also see the opening of at least 6 additional centres in the 5 camps.

As proposed, two new workshops on embroidery were opened during the reporting period. One of them is situated in Muljan, Camp Gorpara and the other in Bhararia, Camp Balirtek.

1.4.5 Poultry/Animal Husbandry:

MIP's poultry programme has achieved significant success in the Manikganj area and is well on the way to becoming a model project. The programme covers 217 villages of Manikganj and is expected to complete coverage of all 252 villages under the project area. The poultry programme has become an extremely important subsidiary source of income, especially for the women.

Training in poultry rearing was provided. Although not planned in the project proposal, training was given because of demand from the field. Refresher courses and follow-up services for the trained members have been ongoing.

The following statistics (upto December 1987) will reveal the strength of the programme:

Each key rearer rears 9 hens and one cock and earns a monthly income of Tk.200. A model rearer rearing 22 hens and 3 cocks Tk.500. Poultry workers who provide vaccination to the birds, receive a fixed fee in exchange for their service. Chick rearing units collect 1 day old chicks and rear them for two months before selling.

In rural areas of Bangladesh, proper veterinary services are lacking. To bridge this gap MIF has trained 95 village veterinary workers of whom 61 are active in their villages.

As mentioned in the proposal, 28 rural primary veterinary surgeons were trained and it is heartening to note that 27 of them are active. There were 36 kits distributed and 217 villages covered during the reporting period. There are two artificial insemination centres in MIF in operation at village level to support the cattle-rearing programme.

1.4.6 Pisciculture:

Pisciculture was not included in the priority list. Work done so far has therefore not been extensive. The present position is shown below:

1.5 Skills Training:

During 1985-87, a refreshers course on Bee Keeping was given to 20 members; and 15 members were trained in vegetable dyeing of whom 13 are active (4 in Manikganj, 2 in Betila, 3 in Krishnapur, 2 in Gorpara and 2 in Balirtek).

1.6 Women's Income/Employment Generation Programme:

Although MIP does not have a separate programme for women per se, so many women group members have taken up employment/income generation activities that they merit a separate section in the report.

A detailed list of the activities they are involved in is given in the Appendix.

A glance at the table shows that each camp has their own special activities depending on the members' skill, interest and other factors. This goes to show that one cannot start an income generation activity in an area, just because it has been successful in another, if the factors that go to make it a success are not present. For example, Novogran has a block printing sub centre because the women workers wanted one and Muljan in Camp Gorpara has an embroidery sub centre because that was what the women of the area wished for. Gradually, the Ayesha Abed Foundation will assist the women's groups with training and provide related support services at its Manikganj Production and Service Centre. AAF will also take over some of the functions of BRAC extension workers in the field and support the groups after BRAC has withdrawn from Manikganj.

Women were also trained in silk charkha spinning. A big enterprise that started in 1986 is the landless' brick field. All landless organizations contributed their share and BRAC also provided credit.

Members of the landless organizations worked and managed the brick field. Total profit of one year was Tk.268,000 and 235 men and 16 women found permanent wage employment in the brick field.

1.7 Health Programme:

In Phase-IV of MIP, health and family planning were emphasized. In addition to the preventive and curative measures

disseminate by paramedics and shasthya shebikas/sheboks (health auxiliaries chosen from among the group members), MIF undertook.

- o Primary Health Care (PHC) programme which has 8 components (1) Oral Rehydration Solution (ORS), (2) Immunization, (3) Nutrition education, (4) Traditional Birth Attendant (TBA) training, (5) Safe water, (6) Health education, (7) Basic curative training, (8) Family Planning.
- o Tuberculosis programme with NATAB (a government organisation).
- o Vitamin 'A' capsule distribution.

During the reporting period 27 shasthya shebikas/sheboks were given an advanced intensive training course.

The mass vaccination programme has completed coverage of 107 villages in MIF and the rest are being covered. This programme is being done in cooperation with the government.

Altogether, there are 811 active dais (TBAs) in the 5 Camps in MIF - 240 in Manikganj; 230 in Betila; 93 in Krishnapur; 131 in Balirtek and 147 in Gorpara.

The KAC programme started in October 1986.

The Vitamin 'A' capsule distribution programme is being carried out in a systematic manner. A survey of all children of 6 months to 6 years age is carried out in all BRAC villages. There are 2 cycles of Vitamin 'A' capsules for children. The first cycle is given in June-July and other in November-December. Normal children get 1 capsule at each cycle while those suffering from nightblindness receive 2 capsules at each cycle. BRAC keeps a record of the children being given the capsules and motivates them. They also see to it that the children receiving the first capsule are brought in time for the second one. In every village the government health machinery has been activated. The government Health Assistants visit the villages where a BRAC staff Health Worker is present together with a shebika/shebok and a member of the Village Health Committee. The Health Assistant then personally feeds the Vitamin 'A' capsules to the identified children.

The TB programme is being carried out with NATAB the government organization. In BRAC villages all patients who have a persistent cough for one month are identified and their sputum sent by the Shasthya Shebikas/Sheboks for testing. The paramedics test it for positive-negative reactions at the Betila Field Centre. Positive patients are treated for a period of one year. They deposit Tk.100 as security money and are given treatment for one year. At the end of one year Tk.75 is returned to them and Tk.25 is given to the shasthya shebika/shebok who did the follow up service of seeing the treatment being carried out. In addition, health education for positive patients and neighbours is also carried out.

CONCLUSION:

1985 - 1987 has been an important period for the consolidation of landless institutions in Manikganj project. Almost all the village grassroots group have now been formed into village organization meaning they all now have more strength. The union coordination committees are more functional. Presently the union coordination committee take up different economic schemes on behalf of the village organizations. The function of the upazila (sub district) coordination committee has proved to be of crucial importance for solving both individual and common or group problems both social and economic.

Income and employment activities have expanded and women's increasing participation in work outside the home has been significant. The Government has taken MIP's poultry programme as a model and started to replicate it at the upazilas. The first MIP brick field operation was completed with a net profit of Tk.2,68,000.

MIP's health programme has matured. Non-formal primary education programme is very successful and popular. Legal aid is gaining in importance in MIP and the para legals are now called in for counselling service and to help in 'shalish'.
