Japanese Ambassador Meets MAGD Students

H. E. Ambassador of Japan Mr. Masayuki Inoue visited Savar campus of BRAC University on 04 March 2009 to meet the MA in Governance and Development (MAGD) Batch 3 students. First Secretary Mr. Hiroshi Omura and Economic Researcher Ms. Tomoko Inagaki of the Embassy of Japan accompanied him during the visit. Drawn from mid-level civil servants, a group of 25 students are currently doing their residential semesters at Savar campus. The program is run by the Institute of Governance Studies (IGS) of BRAC University.

H. E. Mr. Inoue joined the Japanese Foreign Service in 1973 and picked up his current position in April 2006. In his keynote address at Sulla Bhaban, Mr. Inoue explained about the emergence of Japan as an Industrial and Economic Power after the World War II and her present 'soft power' role in the international arena. He also touched upon Japan's liberal ODA policy, high quality aid and trade investment in Bangladesh. The session was chaired by BRAC University Vice Chancellor Professor Jamilur Reza Choudhury, while Coordinator of the MAGD program Professor Dr. M. Emdadul Haq delivered the well coming address. Among others, BRAC University Pro-Vice Chancellor Dr. Salehuddin Ahmed and campus super Mr. Mahfuzul Bari Chowdhury attended the occasion. It may be mentioned here that the MAGD students are regularly exposed to the high profile dignitaries coming from multiple professional backgrounds.

ARC Update

ANGAN Lecture by Marina Tabassum

Architect Marina Tabassum, one of a well known female well-known architect in Bangladesh, delivered a presentation of her selected works in ANGAN lecture on 17 March 2009. She is the principal of MTA (Marina Tabassum Architects). She shared the journey through her career. The lecture was very lively as she has been a big inspiration to the students.

Lecture by Moushumi Bhowmik

Moushumi Bhowmik, the famous Indian Bengali singer delivered four lectures on folk music for the course ARC 293: Music Appreciation of the Department of Architecture on 17& 24 March 2009. She is working on a research project on Bengali folk music with the India Foundation for the Arts since 2004. Her lectures reflected her research findings as well as her experience as a singer and composer. Moushumi Bhowmik is popularly acknowledged as one of the diverse singers of modern Bangla songs. Her albums, including "Ekhono golpo lekho" and "Ami ghor bahir kori" enjoy great popularity in Bengalispeaking areas of India and in Bangladesh. She composed for several Bangla documentary and art films. Her most recent film Matir Moyna (The Clay Bird) won the Critics' Prize at Cannes in 2002 and Best Music at Kara Film Festival, Karachi in 2003.

Study Tours

Freshmen students visited Panamnagar area in Sonargaon as part of their design and graphic communication courses on 21 March 2009 along with their studio teachers. Panamnagar has been included as the reserved archeological sites in Bangladesh for its rich heritage value. They analysed the buildings and documented details through sketches and measured drawings.

Students of the course ARC 501: Design Studio IX and ARC 394: Contemporary South Asian Architecture visited Bogra on 20th March, 2009 for a day trip. They visited two contemporary projects: SOS Children's Village and Training & Resource Center (TARC), BRAC, Bogra as well as Mahastangor museum. Faculty members accompanied the students. SOS Children's Village is designed by architect Raziul Ahsan. It is an orphanage for 100 children comprising ten family homes, an administration building, a community house, faculty residences, a primary school, and a secondary school. The other building TARC, which is designed by architect Jalal Ahmed, another promising architect of Bangladesh is mainly a Training & Resource Center. There are residential facilities for the trainee and the staff. Courtyards, low height forms, pitch roof, intimate scale- make these projects excellent. This tour aimed at increasing students' analyzing power and their perception about space and form as well as inspiring the future architects to search the identity of our Architecture.

BDI Update

Management of Land Acquisition Resettlement and Rehabilitation

BRAC Development Institute (BDI) is designing a semester long post-graduate certificate course on Management of Land Acquisition, Resettlement and Rehabilitation (MLARR). The pilot course is due to commence in May 2009. Designed primarily for professionals, the program aims at giving participants the knowledge and skills necessary to specialize in resettlement and land acquisition services as consultants, professionals, or practitioners. The course covers the general theory and practice of resettlement and focuses on Bangladesh as the "terrain." It provides an understanding of international best practice and a comparative reading of the Bangladeshi context, from the legal, policy and pragmatic perspectives.

100-Day Employment Generation Programme (EGP)

The 100-day Employment Generation Programme (EGP) is a social safety net programme of the government of Bangladesh that aims to provide guaranteed employment for the targeted extreme poor citizens during the lean seasons. This initiative came in response to the soaring food prices, which are especially hard to keep up with for the poorest and jobless poor.

I. Evaluation of Phase I of EGP

BDI and the Research and Evaluation Division (RED) of BRAC worked on this evaluation with the National Food Policy Capacity Strengthening Programme (NFPCSP). NFPCSP, which is implemented by the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations, was requested to carry out a programme evaluation by the Government of Bangladesh. II. Qualitative Research on EGP

BDI's work provides the qualitative component in the overall evaluation. The institute was asked to collaborate because of its clear competitive advantage in terms of gathering field level qualitative knowledge and its capacity to carry out extensive field research. After being submitted to the government, the paper has received positive feedback and corresponds with, as well enriches much of the other studies conducted on the programme. Findings from the qualitative research reveal that beneficiaries mostly reported positive impacts and want the programme to continue. They have been able to survive through the price hikes, as well as escape the unemployment the lean period brings with it. Food consumption remained steady for beneficiaries and many reported being free form loan dependency as well.

III. CPD Organized Workshop

Syed Hashemi participated as a discussant in the CPD (Centre for Policy Dialogue) organized workshop on the 100 Day Employment Generation Programme. Chaired by Professor Rehman Sobhan, the workshop was attended by HT Imam, advisor to the Prime Minister, Akbar Ali Khan, former caretaker government advisor and Dr. Atiur Rahman, chairman of Unnayan Shamunnay.

Impact of the Food, Fuel and Financial Crises in Bangladesh

BDI has recently completed research to communicate the urgency of the food, fuel and financial crises impact in Bangladesh to policymakers and a global audience at the G20 meeting. The Institute of Development Studies (IDS) designed this pilot qualitative research with the aim to generate rapid, responsive research outputs that can speak to policy debates in this early part of the crisis. BDI's work provides the qualitative research carried out in Bangladesh, which is one of the five strategically selected developing countries in IDS' overall research. The other countries are Indonesia, Jamaica, Kenya and Zambia.

Noted filmmaker Morshedul Islam, Barrister Sara Hossain, and journalist Munni Saha participated in a discussion on the film after the screening, which was moderated by Professor Firdous Azim, Chairperson of the English and Humanities Department at BRAC University and a Lead Research of the Pathways Programme.

The presentation highlighted the impacts climate variability will have on women in both urban and rural areas. It also provided a summary of the key gender related issues that had emerged during the International Conference on Climate Change and Urban Poverty: Infrastructures of Development, last January.

Deepening Democracy Building Citizenship and Promoting Participation Project

- -How do citizens in rural communities perceive government?
- -Who do they consider as representatives of the government?
- -What are their expectations from the government?

Public Lecture by Professor Per Pinstrup-Andersen from Cornell University

BDI, BRAC University, and the Bangladesh Agricultural University hosted a public lecture by Professor Per Pinstrup-Andersen on the 9th of February at BRAC Center Auditorium.

Professor Andersen was Director General at the International Food Policy Research Institute from 1992 to 2002 and recipient of the World Food Prize in 2001. He is currently the H.E. Babcock Professor of Food, Nutrition and Public Policy at Cornell University.

Dr Hossain Zillur Rahman, Executive Chairman, PPRC, and former Advisor to the Caretaker Government and Abdus Sattar Mandal Vice Chancellor BAU chaired the event. Professor Per Pinstrup-Anderson spoke on "Eradication of Hunger in the Context of Higher Food Prices. The event was followed by a four day training session, "A social entrepreneurship approach to Graduate and Undergraduate Training in Policy Analysis for Global, National and Local Food Systems."; which was conducted by Professor Per Pinstrup- Anderson.

Moving towards Quality Education: Understanding the challenges and identifying prospective solutions for ultra-poor communities

BRAC- Development Institute (BDI) is working with the Institute of Educational Development- BRAC University (BU-IED) on their research project, "Moving towards Quality Education: Understanding the challenges and identifying prospective solutions for ultra-poor communities."

The key aims of the study are as follows:

- -To provide a comprehensive understanding of the challenges and constraints of meaningful access and quality education for ultra-poor children
- -To advocate for policy changes that will lead to an overall improvement of mainstream primary education
- -To suggest alternative approaches and strategies that will guide the design of future educational interventions and action-research by key stakeholders and partners of this scoping study.

New research program on freedom movements and economic struggles in Bengal

BDI, along with Dhaka University's Department of History, is starting a new research program on freedom movements and the economic struggles in Bengal. The purpose will be to rediscover our history and highlight those who have made sacrifices for political and economic emancipation.

Movements will include, Nil Bidroho, Shautal Bidroho, the first Indian war of independence, the Faraizi movement, Nankar Bidroho, Tebagha Andolon, Nachol bidroho, the naval rebellion, Azad Hind Fouj, Khapra Ward, Bhasha Andolon, Six points, the 1969 democratic movement, the war of independence, jail killings, the anti-autocratic movement, etc.

CfL Workshop Conducted by Sanjoy Banerjee

Teacher Training: Making BRAC Primary School an Interactive Haven

An MOU was signed between the Directors of BRAC CfL Mrs Sarwat Abed, and BRAC Education Program (BEP) Dr. Shafiqul Islam to train BRAC Primary School (BPS) teachers. This Teacher Training, conducted by CfL faculty members, was initially planned through several focused group discussions to assess the needs of teachers in terms of teaching English language in the context of Bangladesh. It aims to support BPS teachers to adopt and apply Communicative Language Teaching (CLT) approach in their classrooms, and be able to communicate the language effectively in real-life context. This initiative is in its piloting stage, divided in four phases: Fluency, Accuracy, Methodology, and Micro Teaching, started on January 17th, 2009 and will end in August 2009. BRAC Primary teachers will then be able to implement CLT in BRAC's Primary Schools countrywide.

Language Pedagogy Workshop with Lisa Ponzetti

English Language Fellow Lisa Ponzetti facilitated a workshop on Saturday March 14, 2009 to explore approaches, beliefs and attitudes in teaching. Teachers spent the first part of the session being creative with Legos, followed by a reflective discussion on their vision of education. This session was conducted in connection with CfL's role in the development of an integrated curriculum for the Savar Residential semester.

IEEE Student Branch Update

An Academic Visit to Atomic Energy Centre, Dhaka

Members of IEEE BRACU student branch visited the Atomic Energy Centre, Dhaka (AECD) on February 23, 2009, a place that has been the home to a wide range of research works, widely accepted both nationally and internationally. From environmental pollution to tracing melamine in milk, AECD has been contributing for more than decades to almost every possible aspect of the nation.

The Atomic Energy Centre, Dhaka started its journey, when Bangladesh Atomic Energy Commission (BAEC) was formally constituted in 1973. BAEC is a scientific research organization committed to ensure peaceful utilization of atomic energy through acquisition, development and application of scientific and technological knowledge by undertaking research and development (R&D) in various fields of science. The Atomic Energy Centre, Dhaka is the pioneer institution of BAEC and one of its prime research establishments. The Centre stands proudly at the core of Dhaka carrying out research and development works on some specialized

branches of physical sciences, which includes Accelerator facilities division, Chemistry division, E & GS Division, Materials Science Division, Electronics Division and Non-Destructive testing Division.

Upon reaching the facility, they were cordially received by one of the officers of AECD and from there they were led to the Accelerator Facilities Division. Here they were given a short description of how this part of the research centre operates and what its uses are. They learned many interesting facts and it was fun to see that the things, which we have learned, so far only in books, are coming to reality. This department provides many services including, multi-elemental analysis of samples related to environment, health, agriculture and industry, nuclear reaction analysis and many other services of technological and scientific importance. Then they moved on to the room where real things were happening! The room was equipped with a 3 MV Van de Graff Accelerator and its auxiliary system which were installed in 1964. The Van de Graff generator was left open for maintenance services, so luckily we got a chance to have a full interior view of the accelerator. The Accelerator is capable of producing proton, deuteron and alpha particles of energy 0-3 MV with beam currents in the range of nano to microamperes.

They visited Analytical Chemistry Division. This department carries out R&D works in various branches of chemistry focusing the socio-economic development of the country, particularly in the field of environmental pollution, nutrition, nuclear analytical techniques in materials analysis and the application tracer technology in industry. One of the main functions of this lab is to check records of environmental pollution throughout the country on a regular basis.

The interesting part of the tour was the GC-MS (Gas chromatography-mass spectrometry) Lab. When they entered this lab, the senior scientific officers of AECD were having an important meeting (were discussing about a problem related to tracing melamine in powder milk). Quite interestingly, this is the lab where the content of melamine in powder milk was detected. They were quite fortunate to see the whole procedure of melamine detection in front of our own eyes. It is a fully computerized procedure, where samples are fed into a device. This device separates the samples into different compounds into two steps the GC & MS, which are two different procedures. These compounds are identified by the computer, through different graph readings, which are further analyzed by the scientists to figure out the required material.

Trip ended with the visit to the AECD library. It is a well-equipped library with an atmosphere that would give anyone the urge to read and learn more. "The urge to read and learn more!" Perhaps this is the foundation of all advances in science, starting from the tiniest atoms to the vast, endless universe!

MNS update

International Conference on Plant Breeding and Seed for Food Security (ICPSFS 2009), Dhaka

The International Conference on Plant Breeding and Seed for Food Security, organized by the Plant Breeding and Genetics Society of Bangladesh was held at the auditorium of the Bangladesh Agricultural Research Council, Dhaka. Professor Naiyyum Choudhury and Dr. Aparna Islam participated in the conference. The theme of the conference was Plant Breeding and Seed System for Food Security. Professor Naiyyum Choudhury chaired the scientific session of the conference on intellectual property rights and related issues on 12 March, 2009.

Science Fair at the City International School, Dhaka

Professor A. A. Ziauddin Ahmad was invited as the Chief Guest at the Annual Science Fair of the City International School at Banani, Dhaka on March 12, 2009.A. A. Ziauddin inaugurated the fair and visited different science projects done by the students. Dr Mohammad Rafiqul Islam, Assistant Professor, at the MNS Department acted as a judge at the fair.

BAS-USDA Workshop on Prioritization of Research in Agricultural and Life Sciences

The Bangladesh Academy of Sciences organized a two-day national workshop on prioritization of research in agricultural and life sciences funded under the joint BAS-USDA endeavour in agricultural and life sciences.

Professor Naiyyum Choudhury was the coordinator of the workshop. More than two hundred delegates from different universities and research organizations in the public and private sectors participated in the workshop and made important recommendations on priority areas of research in crop sciences, fisheries, livestock, and forestry and also on new and emerging areas of life sciences. Professor Choudhury presented the background paper explaining the BAS-USDA initiated endowment fund for supporting research in agricultural and life sciences. He mentioned that the Bangladesh Academy of Sciences and the US Department of Agriculture have made an agreement for funding research projects in agricultural and life sciences through the creation of an endowment fund. The Academy has developed a guideline for the support programme and working paper for discussion in the workshop. The launching of the programme would be made based on the recommendations of this important workshop. Dr. Aparna Islam, Mr. Nustak Ibn Ayub, Ms. Adeeba Raihan and Ms. Jedunnessa Chowdhury of the MNS Department participated in the workshop with Ms. Raihan acting as the Master of Ceremony.

UNESCO Workshop on Bioethics

Professor Naiyyum Choudhury participated in the UNESCO Workshop on Bioethics organized jointly by the UNESC, UGC and the Ministry of Planning, Government of the People's Republic of Bangladesh. The workshop focused on methodologies of application and integration of Asian (and international) ethical knowledge, epistemology and ideas into practice and how to improve ethics of research, policy making and decision making with examples from medical ethics, biotechnology, public health and environmental issues and teaching ethics. Professor Darryl Macer, Regional Advisor, UNESCO, Bangkok, Thailand delivered the keynote paper on "Implementing the Universal Declaration on Bioethics and Human Rights (UDBHR) into Teaching, Research and Policy". Professor Naiyyum Choudhury chaired the scientific session on bioethics in Bangladesh.

Inception Workshop on "Strengthening the Legal Framework for Biotechnology"

Dr. Aparna Islam, of the MNS Department, participated in a day-long inception workshop on "Strengthening the Legal Framework for Biotechnology". The workshop was organized by the Bangladesh Agricultural Research Council (BARC) and Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) in Dhaka on 19 March 2009. The speakers in the workshop discussed the present status of the legal framework existing in the country and what modifications were needed to attain safe and sustainable use of biotechnology, especially to boost the agricultural productivity. Regulatory measures in the fields of intellectual property rights (IPR), plant variety protection (PVP), food law and food safety, sanitary and phytosanitary were emphasized got priority in various sessions. Relevant stakeholders from the government, non-government, research and academic institutions and organizations of the country participated in the workshop.

It is worth mentioning that in December 2008, BRACU in collaboration with the International Center for Genetic Engineering and Biotechnology (ICGEB) organized a similar symposium entitled "Regulatory and Safety Issues in Commercialization of Biotechnology Research in Developing Countries". During that symposium various issues like IPR, patents, biosafety, bioethics, regulatory affairs, and other regulatory issues involved in the fields and clinical trials, and in the commercialization of biotech products were discussed. Participants were informed about the international practice and legal obligations to be followed prior to releasing any biotech products.

IAP Executive Committee Meeting, Amsterdam, Netherlands

At the invitation of the Inter Academy Panel on International Issues(IAP), Professor Naiyyum Choudhury participated in the Executive Committee Meeting of the IAP held at the Netherlands Academy of Arts and Sciences (KNAW), Amsterdam on 23-25 March 2009. Apart from the members of the Executive Committee, the Meeting was attended by representatives from the Royal Society, UK, the Academy for the Developing World(TWAS), US National Academy of Sciences, Science Council of Japan, International Council for Science(ICSU), Inter Academy Panel(IAC) and Inter Academy Medical Panel, and All European Academies(ALLEA). The Meeting discussed at length some important global issues like food security, present financial crisis and role of science, young scientists' congress, biodiversity, GMOs etc.

Departmental Study Tour 2009

On March 25 2009 eight faculty members and staff and sixteen students from the Department of MNS started off on a study tour towards Cox's Bazar and St. Martin's by road. The group traveled for more than thirteen hours throughout the night of March 25, 2009 and the better part of March 26, but nobody seemed to be tired once they saw the sand and water. After quickly checking into the hotel everyone jumped into

the Bay. A refreshing dip in the water was followed by a fresh coconut to beat the heat. But it was still a study tour and that fact seemed to be present in everyone's mind. The MS Biotechnology students could be seen assembled on the beach with data collecting sheets and thermometers trying to understand the abiotic conditions of the environment of Cox's Bazar better.

After having their lunch, the group rushed off towards the Bangladesh Meteorological Department's Radar Station. They went to the display centre from where the changes in weather were monitored. Then the participants were escorted into the hi-tech instrument room where microwave radiation was sent up into the atmosphere, reflected by the clouds and back to the radar station where they were analyzed. The tour was not only interesting for the students studying physics, but also for those in mathematics, geography and biotechnology. The day ended with another mouthwatering dinner at one of the popular cafes. Later some sat on the beach listening to the soothing sound of the waves with the cool breeze blowing on their faces.

The team set off towards Teknaf at 6am on March 27, 2009 to take the ferry to St. Martin's. The drive itself was wonderful especially that early in the morning. On both sides one could see the greenery which was slowly replaced by fields of salt farms. The trip to St. Martin's took three hours from Teknaf and the view from the ferry of the river Naaf was simply breath-taking. Only three hours were available to explore the island and that was put to optimal use. After a quick lunch everyone went off on colourful three-wheeler vans to the Abakash Beach. The turquoise blue, crystal-clear water was too tempting to resist. All the participants waded in to find out that the water level was knee deep for at least a km. Fun in the water ended with another data collection session .

The return trip from St. Martin's to Teknaf gave the group a chance to see the sunset over Naaf river. On arrival at Cox's Bazar a hot BBQ dinner was awaiting the team on the beach with a bonfire in the centre. After a long day everybody was starving and ate to their fill while being entertained by local children who sang and danced for them.

On March 28, 2009 The participants visited the Beach Sand Mineral Exploitation Centre(BSMEC), where its Director, Mr.Mashrur Zaman gave a fascinating lecture about the various minerals isolated from the beach sands. He was showered with questions from the interested students. Later he took the group for a tour of their laboratory. The rest of the day was spent shopping at the Burmese market which ended with a trip to Himchori.

It was definitely quite a memorable trip, which was evident from the saddened faces as the team waved goodbye to Cox's Bazar and the waves of the vast blue Bay of Bengal. The participants arrived in Dhaka in the early morning of March 29, 2009.

Seminar on Higher Education in Russia, Dhaka, 30 March, 2009

Dr Mohammad Rafiqul Islam, of MNS Department was a special guest in the seminar entitled "Higher Education in Russia" held on March 30, 2009 at the Russian Centre of Science and Culture, Dhaka. CENTER FOR HEALTH SYSTEMS STUDIES

COMPREHENSIVE PRIMARY HEALTH CARE (CPHC)

To achieve the study objective study questionnaires have been developed. The study team members had several meetings to finalize the questionnaires. For quantitative component two sets of questionnaire have been developed, one for the in patient and out patient clients of the Upazila Health Complex services and the other one for the health service providers of the Upazila Health Complex services. BRAC University Business Club (BIZ BEE) organized a one day study trip to Mymensing on March 20, 2009, to experience two of the luminous and time-worthy entrepreneurial ventures in Bangladesh, Reptiles Farm Ltd. Mymensing (A Closed Cycle Captive Breeding Crocodile Farm) and Crimson Strawberry Farm at Mymensing Agriculture Institute

Mr. Mostaque Ahmed, founder, Reptiles Farm who is also popularly known as Mr. Crocodile has a very lucrative and ambitious vision which stated "To strive hard to be a provider of world class crocodile skin and position the country in the higher value segment of the international leather market". He started this venture from 2004 in Mymensing. At first there were only 74 to 80 crocodiles. With an aim to export over 5000 pieces of crocodile skins annually, the farm is expected to create a base for earning up to US\$ 5 million by 2015. They are now ready to make export of their first batch of crocodile baby. Most of their

buyers are from European countries and some are also from Japan. Mr. Mostoque was very enthusiastic to have us in his farm and gave us an elaborate tour of 15 acre land full of ferocious reptiles each of about 14 feet long.

Strawberry cultivation is really a profitable effort that should be practiced commercially in Bangladesh. Experiencing the beauty and cultivation method of the strawberry farm for the first time was really great. The management of that strawberry farm to let them pluck the strawberries (Per piece 20 taka) fully at free of cost.
