Teams were asked to build innovative and sustainable business ventures that would help restore the rights and dignity of some 10 million refugees by 2022.

Team Resurgence – comprising of Rafayet Khan, Ivana Afsara, Naziba Wafa and Mashiyat Rahman – emerged as the winners of the event at BRAC University, with their presentation of developing a sanitary pad made from an invasive water hyacinth species or "kochuripana". Large scale manufacture of the pad will

create jobs for refugees, improve social outcomes and reduce an invasive species. When asked about the importance of such events in a student's life, Naziba Wafa of the winning team says that the competition "has not only helped us grow professionally, but also personally. The various field visits, meetings, seminars have helped us realize our individual potentials and develop new skills to increase

our knowledge in our respective areas of interest."

The winners will go to Taiwan in March 2017 for the regional stage to compete with top teams from Dubai, Shanghai, San Francisco, Boston and London. The top five teams from these places will be competing in the HULT Prize Global finale in Clinton Global Initiative in New York later in 2017.

A new door of opportunity

Bangladesh Business & Disability Network (BBDN) has created a platform to facilitate people with disabilities, with a view to count them as active workers and spread observance of international and national labour standards. Murteza Rafi Khan, project Director of A K Khan & Co Limited approached BRAC University Computer Club, through the assistance of OCA, to build a new website for BBDN. After intense hard work, on December 16th, three CSE students named Md Asif Bin Khaled, Mahmudul Hasan and Asif Salman Malik developed a website for them. While talking to Mr Khaled he said that the kind of initiative Mr Khan took by involving a university club had really helped the web developers to contribute in a socially impactful development project.

German language course

On November 24th, 2016, BRAC Institute of Languages (BIL) officially launched the German language course in a programme held at BRACU auditorium. Lady Sayeda Sarwat Abed, Director, BIL was present at the event as chief guest and shared her opinions about the importance of learning German. A good overview was delivered, about both educational and career opportunities in Germany. Speakers also informed the audience on how the Embassy of the Federal Republic of Germany in Dhaka would assist students in the admission process. Classes will start from January 2017.

Erasmus Programme

A recent exchange programme opened up under the CSE/CS department where undergraduate students were invited Staffordshire University in UK where they will be paid £850 per month for up to 5 months, funded by Erasmus+, to complete their thesis projects. CSE/CS students are encouraged to apply for the programme. Eligibility is based on the following criteria: completion of minimum 100 credits, a minimum CGPA of 3, an IELTS score of 6, and a valid passport. The programme was approved by Dr Jia Uddin, Dr Md Haider Ali, and Dr Farhat M Iftekharuddin, and sponsored by Erasmus+.

Sleeping ugly is trendier




A shocking innovation: Plexus

The amount of electricity we consume is massive, and taking time to calibrate the numbers every now and then is hardly possible. Thus, we cannot prevent electricity theft and bill tampering.

What if there was a mobile application to monitor this situation and that keeps an update of electricity consumption? From the CSE department of BRAC University, Professor Dr Amitabha Chakrabarty, along with his students Hasnain Wafiq, Moneruzzaman Manik, and Mohannad Zoha, started this project which can calibrate the amount of electricity and show the results through a smartphone app.

How things work: The system needs to be installed in the meters which are going to be calibrated. The app is going to show the real-time

Support from the government: Dr Amitabha Chakrabarty mentioned that the prototype itself was substantial, and in order to make it suitable for the system, they will be needing the government to participate.

Plexus is an extensive research project and through 8 months of hard work, Dr Amitabha and his team made a functional prototype that can be stretched to even further implementing grounds in the near future.



Baliati Palace - an architectural relic of the early 18th century

Balitai Zamindar bari is located in Manikganj district in Saturia upazila. It was built by a salt merchant named Gobinda Ram Shaha, who belonged to the same Baliati family that founded the Jagannath University.

BRAC University often arranges short study trips for the students and the Zamindar bari can be an ideal spot for the next tour. The palace is rich with

history and can provide the students with an insight on the luxurious life of royal families during the 18th century. Students can also learn about the architectural significance of the place, not to mention its beauty.

The 5.88 acres of the palace consists of 3 royal buildings, a museum and more than 10 small buildings. Beyond the palace, there



are two lakes surrounded by walls which heighten the beauty of the palace significantly. To enhance the magnetism of the palace, there are more than a thousand trees which blend well with the hundred-year-old buildings.

This would definitely be a worthwhile trip for the university authority to consider arranging. Students interested in visiting by themselves, or with family can consult

with local tour companies to arrange a trip. Otherwise, there is a direct bus from Gabtoli (SB Link) to Saturia at a price of 60 taka per person only.


Despite being one of the architectural grandeurs and having a feasible distance from the city, it has not gained much popularity. We hope our voice reaches far enough to give this

with the runners up trophy in the Men's Doubles category. Bold shots and a free-flowing playing style made our university a team to watch for the next edition of the tournament.

However, BRACU failed to live up to expectations this Fall, 2016. The tournament, held during 13th - 15th December, started a day after the end of final exams at our university. This was possibly a significant factor which contributed to the poor performance of the team. The three-day tournament featured some of the best table tennis players at the

university level playing in three different categories. Highlights of BRACU's performance in each format of the game is given below.

Teams: Held on Day 1, BRAC University won their first match against University of Liberal Arts Bangladesh (ULAB) in straight sets. A loss to North South University (NSU) afterwards set up a semifinal clash against the hosts United International University (UIU). BRACU lost the semifinal 1 - 3 to UIU.

Doubles: The pair of Fahim and Junayed from BRACU finished

as quarterfinalists where they lost to Tameen and Bappy from UIU.

Singles: With only Fahim reaching the 2nd round, every other member of the 5-man team crashed out in their respective 1st round matches.

NSU pulled of a cleansweep and

won all three categories with UIU coming in as runners-up. Whether or not other private universities organize tournaments in the near future is uncertain but UIU will surely host this event again approximately a year from now. If BRACU's team is to do well then regular practice sessions, more intra-university tournaments, proper utilization of facilities in the indoor games room, recruiting young players, and a more structured indoor games committee are just a few areas we need to work on.

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
