Architecture Updates

Symposium held by the Department of Architecture on architecture, history and urban design of Bangladesh

A team of 40 architects, academics and architectural historians from the USA visited BRAC University recently as a part of a 4-day study trip to Bangladesh. A 'Symposium-Discussion session on Architecture of Bangladesh' was held on 30 December at BRAC Center Auditorium arranged by the Department of Architecture and the Institute of Architects Bangladesh [IAB]. Dr. Adnan Morshed, Associate Professor, Catholic University of America, USA and the team leader welcomed the guests. Dr. Ken Breisch, Vice President, Society of Architectural Historians [SAH] USA spoke on the role of SAH in the teaching and profession of architecture. In his encouraging speech, Mr. Dan Mozena, Honorable Ambassador of the USA to Bangladesh shed light on the importance of good relationship between Bangladesh and USA. Professor Ainun Nishat, Vice Chancellor, BRAC University; Dr. Zainab Faruqui Ali, Professor, BRAC University; Ar. Mubashshar Hussain, President IAB; Ar. Jalal Ahmed, IAB; Professor Perween Hasan, Acting Vice Chancellor, Central Women's University; Dr Abu Sayeed, Head, University of Asia Pacific and Professor Shamsul Wares, Dean, University of Asia Pacific spoke on various historical, urban and architectural aspects of Dhaka and Bangladesh. The 40 person team will be visiting Delhi and Chandigarh in India next.

The jury of design project took place in the **Sufia Kamal** auditorium in the National Museum, Shahabagh, Dhaka on 12 December 2011. The project 'Conceiving a city center: Designing the Old Airport, Tejgaon' was focused to make a city center which will bridge the city with nature and people. Transforming the 350 acres of vacant land (old air port site) into a huge public park with water bodies and housing some civic functions, like various types of museums, libraries, book markets, art galleries and theatre village, the exercise concluded with six different proposals. Faculty attended a conference on Climate Change

Imon Chowdhooree, lecturer of the Dept. of Architecture was invited to present his paper in the "8th International NAPSIPAG Conference on Reinventing Governance for Managing Climate Change and Its Adaptation" which was held in Hotel Manang, Thamel, Kathmandu, Nepal from 15 December to 16 December, 2011. The Conference was jointly organized by Central Department of Public Administration (CDPA), Tribhuvan University, Nepal and Network of Asia Pacific Schools and Institutes for Public Administration and Governance (NAPSIPAG). Mr. Chowdhooree presented his paper "A Case of River-side Settlement: Its Resilience to Flood, a Climate Change Variable through the Built Environment" on the first day of the conference. The principle aim of his paper was to find out the ways of adaptation to achieve resilience to flood (as a climate change variable) through the built environment which includes the measures to protect the settlement as a whole and construction systems of individual houses. It also identified the role of different actors and key factors to achieve the resilience. His paper is published in the conference proceedings.

PPDM Faculty attends ToT on "Ecosystem-based Disaster Risk Reduction for Sustainable Development"

M Aminur Rahman, Lecturer of the Postgraduate Programs in Disaster Management (PPDM) attended a Training of Trainers (ToT) on "Ecosystem-based Disaster Risk Reduction for Sustainable Development" held in Bangkok from 6 to 8 December, 2011. The objective of the ToT was to engage with training institutions for incorporating environmental concerns in ongoing disaster management training programmes and build national capacities for implementing ecosystem-based disaster risk reduction (Eco-DRR). This ToT was a collaborative initiative led by the Partnership for Environment and Disaster Risk Reduction (PEDRR) member organizations, namely the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), the International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN) and the Asian Disaster Preparedness Centre (ADPC). PEDRR is also working together with the Capacity for Disaster Reduction Initiative (CADRI) and the Ecosystems and Livelihoods Adaptation Network (ELAN) in delivering this ToT.

BBS Updates

"KALPURUSH 1971"- 160 minutes with freedom fighters

"Kalpurush 1971" was a Victory day program, organized for the first time by BRAC Business School (BBS) - the precious 160 minutes with the Freedom Fighters; that made their contribution more unforgettable to all of us. The program was hosted by **Tanjim Ferdous** who gave a magnificent prologue with his wonderful speech regarding the purpose of the program, why we should have immense respect towards our freedom fighters and why they are considered as the most ideal inhabitants of our country. The program was set in motion with the freedom fighters sharing their tragic, yet inspirational moments, preceded by a very poignant letter from the collection "Ekatturer Chhithi", read out by

Ananda, a student of BRAC University.



The first speaker to share a story was Ferdausi Priyobhashini, a woman who is considered to be a "Birangona". She shared her distressing story of how the Pakistanis had tormented her during the war, a story that brought tears in the eyes of every single spectator present in that room. Then came the Guerilla fighter ASM Shahidullah Khan Badal, who is currently the publisher of 'The Daily New Age'. He told us stories of how the most brilliant young people of that period joined the Crack Platoon and terrorized the Pakistanis, keeping them petrified every moment along with the entire Dhaka city. Next was Ajay Das Gupta to share his part of the story. He reminisced how his journey began from Barisal and how he and Mr.Khaled Mosharrof had worked together to build up armed forces out of the amateur freedom fighters. Mr. Mahfuz Anam, the Editor of 'The Daily Star' was also one of the speakers. He shared the stories of his diplomatic broadcasting, the condition of the war both behind the scenes and face to face, his stories of joining the army and how it was the immense help from the 'Mukti Bahini' that went through innumerous hurdles and brought the Indian army inside our border through scouts, that made the surrender of the Pakistanis possible. He also talked about the possibilities for everybody to do something for the country from their repetitive designations. Wrapping up the session was Retd. Major General ATM Abdul Wahab, the sub-sector commander of Sector-8 at that time, who shared his tale. He referred to how difficult it was to administer a war under an umbrella and narrated explicably how it was made possible to see the light of victory.

When all the speakers were done with their dialogue, a documentary was shown based on the life of a martyr **Safi Imam Rumi**, giving a small glance to his story and few of the letters he wrote during the war, a moment that truly touched the deepest corner of everyone's heart. Following the documentary was a panel discussion, moderated by **Professor Mamun Rashid**. The discussion was initiated by the woman whom we often see in pictures. During war time when the East Pakistanis were not allowed to sit in the assembly, it was **Mrs. Rokeya Sultana Raka**, a student from Dhaka University, who, with a rifle in hand called for the first ever procession, being the one to both instigate and lead it forward. Continuing the discussion with his epigrammatic viewpoints was **Mr. Nuh Alam Lelin**, who talked about his expectations from the people currently dwelling in

the country. After that was the most awaited speech of **Dr. Akbar Ali Khan**, the former advisor of the Caretaker Government. During war, he was an SDO in Habiganj. Though he worked as a Pakistani officer and in spite of of all the warnings of sending him to Karachi, he arranged for a place to store guns for the East Pakistani fighters, using the power that he had. He shared his memories of diplomacy and how he joined the 'Mujibnagar Government', covering aspects of its achievements during the war as well as its post-war failures. Last, but not the least, was the enthusiastic speech of the Director of Gender, Justice & Diversity and Advocacy, BRAC- **Ms. Sheepa Hafiza**, who talked about the position of women in our country and their role in development.



The end to the panel discussion tagged along with it a cultural program where **Shaan, Ruhi, Tasbita** and **Aniruddha**, students from BRAC University performed patriotic songs and songs from 'Shadheen Bangla Betar Kendro'. Our chief artist was **Mr.Sadi Mohammed** who mesmerized us with his patriotic solo performance, preceded with a duet with **Ms.Zainab Ali Farooqui** and a solo by **Topon Bhattacharjee**. The program was given a spectacular finale with our national anthem-'Amar Shonar Bangla', sung by all with downright respect. The program was organized by the students of BBS headed by **Tanjim Ferdous**, and his team members, **Trisha, Shihab, Rumman, Shimul** and **Tasbita** under the supervision of **Mrs. Samina Haque** and **Mr. Saif Hossain**, faculty members of BBS. Although our new generation has not experienced the liberation war, they are fighting their war against all the social, economical and political ties of our nation, declaring a war to bring a better environment and a new ray of hope for the country.

In addition, programme officials of other agencies that have intervention programs in the five treatment slums were invited to participate in the workshop.

Professor **Ainun Nishat**, Vice Chancellor, BRAC University chaired this session while Professor **Syed Hashemi**, Director, BRAC Development Institute and Acting Chairperson, Department of Economics and Social Sciences delivered the vote of thanks.

The keynote papers were delivered by **Ashish Rajadhyaksha**, Senior Fellow Centre for the Study of Culture and Society (CSCS), Bangalore, India and **Professor Perween Hasan**, Vice Chancellor, Central Women's University, Dhaka. **Professor Rajahyaksha's** paper was titled "Being Someone's Symbolic

Other: A Cultural Studies for South Asia" while **Professor Hasan's** paper was titled Presence of the Past: Cultural Connectivities and Continuities in Asia. This session was chaired by **Professor Kuan Hsing** Chen, from the Graduate Institute for Social Research and Cultural Studies, National Chiao Tung University, Taiwan.

With a special focus on the issues of social movement and development, the conference had many panels of group presentations from different countries titled "Cultural-Spatial Politics and Social Movements in Hong Kong", "Culture, Sexuality and Feminism", "Cross-sectoral Synergy in Cultural-Creative SMEs in Hong Kong", "The 'Other' Koreans: Mobile Multimedia or Diasporic Subalterns? ", "Remapping Post Cold War Asia: Mobility, Imaginary Space, and Emerging Identities"," Assam", "Transformation of Japanese/South Korean Cinema and Industry: The Past and Present". A special panel titled "Culture, Health and Development" by James P. Grant School of Public Health, BRAC University was held on the second day of the conference. On the second day, a mesmerizing dance named "Fireflies" comprising a selection of haikus by Rabindranath Tagore was performed by Shadhona-A Centre for Advancement of South Asian Culture. The conference also included papers on performing arts (music, theatre and dance), queer theory, literature and cultural studies, nation/region/identity and cinema.

Along with the academic papers, the organisers of the conference created an exhibition space where posters of Naripokkho and Mohila Porishad were displayed. Pathways of Women's Empowerment of BDI and Safia Azim displayed their photographs in the exhibition which was previously published in the photo essay of IACS Journal . A booth was set for constant screening of several short films made by BRAC Development Institute (BDI), and BRAC University students in the exhibition. Pathshala had their separate digital display titled "New Waves" in the exhibition.

This conference was preceded by the Steering Committee Meeting of the IACSS Consortium on 16th December 2011 at GDLN centre, BRAC University. The conference ended with the closing of Consortium for Inter-Asia Cultural Studies Institutions (CIACSI) at the last session of the conference. Thirty three faculties and nine students became members of the IACSS on spot in the conference.

GDLN Updates

Distance Learning Course on the Microfinance Training of the Trainers (MFTOT)

The Eight delivery of the Microfinance Training of Trainers course (MFTOT-7) started on Dec 15 2011 and will continue till April 2012 .





Microfinance is recognized as an effective development interaction that enhances access to financial services by low income individuals. While there is great demand for microfinance

services the main constraint is not a lack of funds but a lack of capacity in operating a sustainable institution. To address this problem, the ADBI, TDLC which is a member of GDLN Asia Pacific and the United Nations Capital Development Fund (UNCDF) Launched the MFToT program in 2005.

The interactive microfinance distance learning course (MFDL) developed by UNCDF was the core learning material for study. Four (4) Interactive Video Conference sessions take place in 4 months at BRAC University Premises along with online tutoring, e-discussion and online exams. Submission of assignments and receiving online tutoring will help participants to master the knowledge of best practice of microfinance.

meeting in New Delhi, India, hosted by GDLN center of The Energy and Resources Institute (TERI- DLC). The meeting took place from 05 to 10 December 2011. BRAC University is the only GDLN Affiliated center in Bangladesh and **Ms. Fahima Khanam** Assistant Director, IT, attended in that GDLN AP regional general meeting. More than 40 representatives from South Asia, East Asia and the Pacific have gathered in TERI, New Delhi to discuss how the region could boost its provision of knowledge exchange and capacity building through the Global Development Learning Network and updated each other their on ongoing programs.

GDLN connects the world through learning. It is a partnership of recognized global institutions which collaborate in the design of customized learning solutions for individuals and organizations working in development. Through tailored learning programs, knowledge and technical assistance programs and state of the art videoconferencing and internet-based learning, GDLN can connect development stakeholders

around the world and bring key resource person for the required field as needed by its clients.

GDLN provides a unique mix of delivery infrastructure, partnership networks, and understanding of how to make effective use of modern information and communication technologies for learning and knowledge exchange. The purpose of our meeting this week has been to share experience on how to make best use of

our network to foster economic and social development in the Asia Pacific region.

The five-day meeting was an opportunity for GDLN Asia Pacific members and partners to assemble and discuss innovative programs and the latest network development and technology enhancement. GDLN Global objectives and strategies were also discussed. An introduction to the status quo was made, and ideas for GDLN global governance and services were presented. The participants discussed how they could work together and what the major differences were between East Asia Pacific region and South Asia region of GDLN.

Meeting attendants were split up into groups and discussed how to create a mechanism of joint programs, what governance is needed, and how this integration was going to benefit both regions. A lot of ideas were raised by all participants. Participants also focused on writing effective proposals. They took the lead from World Bank Institute trainers on thinking more strategically and to look more broadly at clear targets. They were divided into groups, and each group was given a specific scenario for practical simulations. The exercise involved the planning of convincing presentations, teamwork, and competition. Toward the end of the session, the five groups judged each other. It was fun and very educational experience for all the participants.

GDLN began as a World Bank initiative in 1997 but has now grown as a worldwide partnership that includes universities, government institutes and private sector organizations in 120 affiliated centers around the world.

This meeting was an important step for the development learning and knowledge exchange programs in the region and as this meeting was held in South Asia region so it was much more useful for our next activities to this network.

Affiliated Network for Social Accountability (ANSA) -**Engagement with World Bank Country Team and PRAN (in Nepal)**

In December 2011, ANSA-SAR has established connection with World Bank Country Team in Bangladesh and PRAN (in Nepal) for expertise support on Social Accountability tools and Third-Party. 'Capacity Building for Promoting Governance' Programme under The Netherlands Organization for International Cooperation in Higher Education'

From 10th-19th December 2011, a 4 member team, 2 from IGS and 2 from BPATC (Bangladesh Public Administration Training Center) went on a 10-day visit to The Netherlands. The IGS team consisted of **Dr, Rizwan Khair**, Director- In-Charge & **Munir Uddin Shamim**, Senior Programme Manager and BPATC team included A. A. M. Shafiqul Alam, Rector and **Dr. Md. Mahmudul Hasan**, MDS. The purpose of the visit was to finalize the 4-year project named "Capacity Building for Promoting Governance". This is a collaborative initiative of IGS, BRAC University and BPATC being implemented in partnership with Free University of Amsterdam, Institute of Social Studies of Erasmus University and MDF Training and Consultancy B.V (MDF). The project has been undertaken under The Netherlands Organization for International Cooperation in Higher Education (NUFFIC). The project aims at building capacity in IGS and BPATC to transform the public sector in Bangladesh to be responsive to the needs of its citizens.



During the visit, the Bangladeshi team and Dutch Partners finalized the project document through a series of meetings, participatory discussions, question-answer sessions, reviewing documents, presentations and visiting relevant organizations.

MNS Updates

Third Inter-University Mathematics Olympiad

The Department of Mathematics and Natural Sciences (MNS) of BRAC University organized "Inter University Mathematics Olympiad-2011" on Friday, December 9, 2011 in collaboration with Bangladesh Mathematical Society (BMS). The aim of this Mathematical Olympiad was to create the opportunity for our young talented undergraduate students in the country to stand out and illustrate their mathematical and analytical skills. In addition, the event was aimed to create a national awareness for the development of mathematics education at the tertiary level and skills. A total of 146 talented students from 22 different Institutions from all over the country took part in this national competition. **Professor Md. Golam Samdani Fakir**, Pro Vice Chancellor, BRAC University was present as the Chief Guest and **Professor Md. Abdus Sattar**, President, Bangladesh Mathematical Society, as the Special Guest in the Inauguration Ceremony . **Professor A.A. Ziauddin Ahmad**, Chairman, Department of Mathematics and Natural Sciences chaired the ceremony.

In the Closing and Prize Awarding Ceremony held in Xinxian Restaurant in Dhanmondi, Dhaka, former Vice-Chancellor of BRAC University, Professor Jamilur Reza Choudhaury was present as the Chief Guest. The Chief Guest informed that due to the lack of facilities our students were not that prepared for the International Mathematical Olympiad (IMO) which was an annual event for pre-collegiate students. The first IMO was held in Romania in 1959. It has since been held annually, except in 1980. It is gratifying that Bangladesh has been participating at this IMO quite regularly during the recent past. The function was presided over by the Pro-Vice Chancellor of BRAC University, Professor Dr. Md. Golam Samdani Fakir. He congratulated the Department of Mathematics and Natural Sciences of BRAC University for successfully organizing this Third Interuniversity Mathematics Olympiad in technical collaboration with Bangladesh Mathematical Society (BMS). He expressed his opinion that this Olympiad had achieved its goal of motivating the participants to improve their analytical and problem solving skills. Professor A.A.Z. Ahmad, Chair of the Organizing Committee delivered the welcome address. He said the budding mathematicians who were participating in the competition should fill in the gaps left by the great mathematicians like Varaha Mihir, Arya Bhatta, Leelabati, Ramanujan, Abdus Salam and so many others who were born and left their marks in mathematics and astronomy in the past in this very subcontinent.

Out of 250 students who registered online, a total of 146 students participated finally. The syllabus of the olympiad included calculus and coordinate geometry, differential equations, linear algebra, vector algebra, complex variables and basic theory of probability and statistics. Questions were divided into two groups: Analytical part was for one hour and another thirty minutes were allocated for MCQ's. The language of the Olympiad was English. It was an individual contest. The competition selected 10 winners for the 10th position to the 1st position. The

first prize winner **Sheikh Ziauddin**, of Electrical and Electronics Engineering (EEE), Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (BUET) got Tk. 10,000. The second and third prize winners were **Forsad Al Hossain** and **Md. Emroz Khan** of the same department who got Tk. 7,000 and Tk. 4,000 respectively. The fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh prizes went to **Md. Rezaul Karim, Moinul Hossain Rahat, Md. Mukhlasur Rahman Tanvir and Moinul Hossain Rahat** also of the Department of EEE, BUET. The eighth prize winner was **Md. Nazim Uddin Bhuiyan** from the Department of Mathematics, University of Dhaka. The ninth prize was won by **A. S. M. Sohidull Islam** of the Department of Computer Science and Engineering, BUET and the tenth prize winner was again from the EEE Department, BUET, **Partha Sarathi Sarker**. The last seven winners got Tk. 2000 each as prize money. The Chief Guest awarded crests, prize money and certificates to the winners of the competition. The Closing and Prize Awarding Ceremony was followed by dinner.

First Bangladesh Urban Forum Conference

Ms. Moushumi Zahur, Assistant Professor of MNS, BRACU attended and worked as rapporteur at the first International Conference of Urban Forum, held on 5 to 7 December, 2011, Dhaka, Bangladesh. The three-day long conference held in Bangabandhu International Conference Centre was inaugurated by the Honourable President of the People's Republic of Bangladesh. Twenty different sessions were organized on different themes regarding urban problems and issue in Bangladesh. The Conference adopted resolution for the development of urban areas taking due cognizance of sustainability.

Conference Proceedings (ICAEE-2011)

A research article of **Muhammad Lutfor Rahman** Lecturer at the Department of Mathematics and Natural Sciences titled "Impact of Cr3+ on the structural and magnetic properties of Mn-Cr-Zn ferrites" was presented at the International Conferences on Advances in Electrical Engineering 2011 (ICAEE-2011), which was held at Independent University on December 19-20, 2011. In this paper mainly focused on the magnetic properties of the bulk magnetic materials which are preferably used for the high frequency devices in the field of communication technologies. The organizer of the conference will arrange for the publication of this work in an international journal in near future.

Fifth International Botanical Conference 2011

Dr. Aparna Islam and **Ms. Jebunessa Chowdhury** attended the three-day long 5th International Botanical Conference 2011. The event was organized by the Bangladesh Botanical Society in collaboration with University of Dhaka (DU) and was held on 9-11 December, 2011, at the Department of Botany, DU. At the Inaugural Session **Begum Matia Chowdhury**, Hon'ble Minister, Ministry of Agriculture, GoB was present as the Chief Guest, while **Professor Dr. A. A. M. S. Arefin Siddique**, Vice Chancellor, DU was the Special Guest. The conference brought together plant scientists from Germany, India, Japan, Korea, Nepal and Pakistan in addition to Bangladeshi botanists on this eve of 40 year celebration of the Bangladesh Botanical Society. A total of about 300 scientists participated in the conference. Several papers were presented in eight scientific sessions. Dr. **Aparna Islam** published a short article in the conference publication entitled "Climate change, emerging infectious diseases and food security". In the article

she emphasizes on the biotic problems that the world is facing due to climate change. The abiotic stresses like temperature, salinity, drought etc. have already been recognized as a causes for crop yield reduction. But not much emphasis has been given to combat climate change related emerging infectious diseases (EIDs) of plants. However, at present EIDs are already playing considerable negative role in food productivity. The impact of this unrecognized problem can be considerable having world wide effects. Therefore, through this article Dr. Islam urged plant scientists to take necessary action immediately.

MS Thesis Presentation

MS thesis viva of four MS Biotechnology students, Nowrin Nowshaba, Md. Abdul Quayum, Md. Shoyeb and Abul Kalam Azad was held on 11th, 15th and 22nd December 2011. All four students worked in various fields of biotechnology. Work of **Nowrin Nowshaba** and **Abul Kalam Azad** were aimed to analyse immune response to diarrhoea drugs. Title of Ms Nowshaba's thesis is "In vitro regeneration of three local potato (Solanum tuberosum L.) varieties of Bangladesh", while Mr. Azad's work was entitled "Comparison of memory B-cell immune response among different age groups after oral cholera vaccination". Both the research studies were carried out under joint supervision of Professor Dr. Firdausi Qadri, of ICDDR,B, and Professor Naiyyum Choudhury, BRACU. Md. Abdul Quayum worked on "Characterization of an ethanol producing yeast isolate and optimization of ethanol fermentation" and Md. Shoveb worked on "Screening of some Bangladeshi medicinal plants for in vitro antioxidant, antimicrobial and insecticidal activities". The work on ethanol fermentation was supervised jointly Dr. Monzur Morshed Ahmed, BCSIR and Professor Naiyyum Choudhury, BRACU. The work on medicinal plant extracts was carried out at BRAC University lab under joint supervision of **Dr. Ashik Mosadek**, Pharmacy Dept, BRACU and Professor Naiyyum Choudhury, BRACU. The thesis evaluation exam was chaired by **Professor AA Ziauddin Ahmad**. Professor Dr. Firdausi Qadri snd Dr. Monzur Morshed Ahmed acted as external examiners. Dr. Mahboob hossain and Dr. Aparna Islam were among the other members of the examination committee. Some faculty members attended the viva-voce exams.

Life Science Article in the Daily Star

One scientific article titled "Probiotics: Bacteria as Medicine" by **Md. Riajul Hossain**, Lecturer in Biotechnology of the Department of Mathematics and Natural Sciences was published on December 06, 2011, in the "Tuesday's Science and Life Section" of the Daily Star. In the article the author stressed that continuous research on the friendly bacteria and investigating their interactions with the gut microflora might help us inventing alternative medication that would bypass antibiotic and some other ways of treatment and would also help preventing many diseases in the first place.

Pharmacy Updates

BRAC University Pharma Society (BUPS), the students' organisation designated for the Department of pharmacy, BRAC University, organized an awareness campaign on HIV/AIDS on World AIDS day December 1, 2011, in association from International Pharmaceutical Students Federation (IPSF), Department of

Pharmacy, BRAC University and James P Grant School of Public Health, BRAC University. The campaign was started by formation of a Human Red Ribbon at BRAC university Premises followed by a rally/procession on HIV/AIDS awareness throughout the Mohakhali and Gulshan Area of Dhaka City.

The first annual report of the project titled 'State of Food Security and Nutrition in Bangladesh: 2010' was launched during this meeting. This is a compilation of findings from the first three rounds of surveillance. A total of 23 service providers from Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University (BSMMU), Infectious Disease Hospital (IDH) and Ashar Alo Society (AAS) participated in the SOP orientation. Participants included 14 doctors (including 1 Deputy Director-Hospital, 2 Associate Professors and 1 Assistant Professor), 8 nurses and 1 program person.. Persons who were involved during the development process of SOP facilitated the orientation. **Dr. Md. Abdul Waheed**, Line Director of National AIDS/STD Programme & Safe Blood Transfusion Program and **Ms. Ismat Bhuiya**, Team Leader of the project & Sr. Project Director of JPGSPH, BRAC University inaugurated and closed the orientation program. All participants were awarded certificates after successfully completing the orientation.

Technical Advisory Group Meeting

A Technical Advisory Group (TAG) meeting was held on December 26, 2011 at the BRAC Centre Inn conference room from 10 am to 1 pm. The agenda of the meeting was to update TAG members on the progress of project activities and share contents of the



two Behavior Change Communication (BCC) guidelines for Sex Worker and Injecting Drug User Interventions. Dr. Md. Abdul Waheed, Line Director of the National AIDS/STD Programme (NASP) & Safe Blood Transfusion Programme, chaired the meeting in absence of Dr Timothy G Evans, Dean of JPGSPH. Professor Dr. Md. Nazrul Islam, former Vice-Chancellor, Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University (BSMMU), Mr. Abu Yusuf Chowdhury, Executive Director of PIACT Bangladesh and Chairperson of STI/AIDS Network of Bangladesh, Dr. Fadia Sultana, Senior Manager & Focal Person from Save the Children International, Ms. Ismat Bhuiya, Team Leader of the Project & Senior Project Director at JPGSPH, BRAC University and other TAG members also attended the meeting. Ms. Ismat Bhuiya presented on the progress of project activities, discussing the challenges faced, and lessons learned. Since the project is being phased out, she also addressed in her presentation the steps which need to be taken to ensure sustainability of the project outcomes. A discussion was held on the importance of making the District AIDS Committee, one of the project activities, functional in all 64 districts of the country. The members provided their technical input on the BCC guidelines and suggested that they get reviewed and approved by the Technical Committee of National AIDS Committee.

Workshop with relevant stakeholders

A workshop was organized on December 26, 2011 at the BRAC Centre Inn conference room from 2:00 pm to 5:00 pm with stakeholders closely working with Sex Workers and Injecting Drug Users to share the comments from the

Technical Advisory Group (TAG) and get their critical inputs on the two Behavior Change Communication (BCC) guidelines for Sex Worker and Injecting Drug User Interventions. The workshop was started with a welcome address from **Ms.**Ismat Bhuiya, Team Leader of the Project & Senior Project Director of JPGSPH, BRAC University. A total of 42 experts attended the workshop, most of whom had already used the draft guidelines at the field level for field testing. The experts shared their experiences on using these and other related guidelines in the field.

National Dissemination Seminar



A national dissemination seminar on the capacity building project titled "Building and Strengthening the Technical and Institutional Capacities of the government, NGOs and Implementing Partners" was held at the Sasakawa Auditorium of ICDDR,B on 29 December 2011 from 9:30 am to 1:00 pm. JPGSPH Consortium at BRAC University organized the event which was held from

9.30 am to 1.00 pm. The project, funded by The Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria (GFATM), had been designed for sustainable progress in combating HIV epidemic in the country. The event was chaired by Pro-vice Chancellor of BRAC University, **Professor Md. Golam Samdani Fakir**. The Senior Adviser and Acting Managing Director of Rockefeller Foundation, Thailand, and former Dean of JPGSPH, **Dr A. M. R. Chowdhury** and Programme Director of HIV/AIDS Sector, Save the Children International, Dr Amzad Ali, were present as special guests. The Chief Guest could not attend the Seminar due to an urgent meeting that was being held simultaneously. Chairperson of STI/AIDS Network, Mr **Abu Yusuf Chowdhury** was present along with former Vice-Chancellor of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University, **Professor Dr Nazrul Islam**. A total of 145 participants attended the seminar.

The capacity building project was designed with three pronged objectives: to develop skilled human resources both at national and district levels for high quality interventions; to develop standard tools and guidelines to enhance capacity of service providers; and to improve coordination of HIV/AIDS related activities at the district level. The project was implemented in 20 districts under seven divisions. A total of 10 tools and guidelines were developed- of them seven were training manuals and three were guidelines targeting organizations working with People living with HIV/AIDS (PLHA) and most-at-risk populations to help provide uniform, standard, comprehensive and quality services. Regarding coordination at district level, the Terms of Reference for the District AIDS Committee (DAC) were developed and notified in the gazette of all 64 districts.

A total of 4832 workforces were developed at the district level for HIV/AIDS program. Among them, 210 master trainers (MTs) from 130 member organisations of STI/AIDS Network were trained on HIV related issues and

subsequently 2024 field-level NGO staff were trained by the MTs. 300 mid-level managers from GO-NGO were trained on HIV/AIDS related issues, management, monitoring and evaluation. 2298 GO-NGO personnel were oriented on TOR of DAC, and coordination mechanism at district level.

The project equipped the organisations with the skills and capacity for planning, implementing, monitoring and evaluating the activities related to national HIV strategies, plans and actions.

Culture, Health and Development Panel at the Inter Asia Cultural Studies Society (IACSS) Conference
